PONDER THIS! Palm Sunday Began the Holy Week for Christians

Jerusalem, culminating with Resurrection Sunday, which falls this year on April 20, 2025.

Palm Sunday is officially Passion Sunday. The liturgy begins in numerous churches with a blessing and procession of palms. It involves a structured and traditional order of worship, with specific prayers, and readings in a particular sequence. Music plays a significant role in liturgical traditions of Palm Sunday, with hymns, chants and other musical forms used to enhance the worship experience.

The stripping of palm into lengthy pieces takes place on the

day before in preparation of their distribution on Palm Sunday to all attendees of church services. As a part of the sacred commemoration, congregants wave the palms and shout “Hosannah” in remembrance of the cry of the people when Jesus arrived in the city.

After reforms of the Roman Catholic liturgies in 1955 and 1969, the ceremonies were somewhat simplified in order to emphasize the suffering and death of Christ, rather than the ceremonial aspects of the palm.

Palm strips are often hand crafted into crosses worn by members


of the congregation as sacred signs of the passion story. In Catholic churches, the palm is later burned to serve as the ashes that are pressed in the shape of a cross on foreheads by priests on Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the Lenten Season, forty days before Easter Sunday.

The palm branches laid before Jesus as he entered Jerusalem carried deep cultural meaning for the people of his time. The crowds affirmed Jesus as the prophesied Messiah and king coming to claim his throne in Jerusalem. Such royal processions are described in 1 and 2 Kings, where people strewed their garments and palms to welcome victorious kings (2 Kings 9:13).

The gospels of the Bible present Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah, and the palm branches symbolize the victory and deliverance Jesus would accomplish through his death and resurrection. The annual stripping of palm fronds was held at the Abyssinian Baptist Church in Harlem, pastored by Rev. Dr. Kevin R. Johnson. Have a Blessed Resurrection Sunday.

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

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Improving Quality of Life as We Make New York City the Best Place to Raise a Family

We all want to enjoy a great quality of life in the greatest city in the world — but it’s the everyday things that matter. New Yorkers don’t want to live with excessive noise, illegal parking, homelessness-related issues, outdoor drug use, aggressive panhandling, and all the other issues that have risen steadily across the five boroughs over the last six years.

That’s why the Adams administration is tackling these problems head on with our new NYPD Quality of Life Division. This is a citywide public safety initiative focused on enhancing trust between communities and the police, while addressing everyday concerns that impact New Yorkers’ sense of safety and well-being. We want our streets

to feel and be orderly and safe for all New Yorkers, especially our families and children.

The Quality of Life Division will begin operations with a pilot program in five precincts and one housing Police Service Area. These commands will have localized, precinct-based teams — called Q-Teams. The teams are made up of officers who have already forged relationships with their communities and have had additional training on resolving quality-of-life conditions — once and for all. To be clear, this is in no way a return to “broken-windows” policing. Our Q-Team officers will improve quality of life for everyone, making our neighborhoods more livable — and will accomplish this important task while working hand-in-hand with neighbors.

The Q-Team pilot program is modeled after CompStat — a system that uses real-time data to determine where police focus their efforts and holds precinct commanders accountable. This tried-and-true method — pioneered in New York City more than 30 years ago — is now being used all over the world. We will use data to track and tackle

quality-of-life issues as they occur and focus our attention accordingly.

The Quality of Life Division builds on our recent achievements in reducing crime across New York City. Because of our administration’s steadfast focus on public safety, we have now had five straight quarters of decreasing crime — since January 1, 2024 — and we are shattering crime record after crime record. The first three months of the year saw the lowest number of shootings in our city’s recorded history. And New York City additionally saw the second fewest number of homicides in recorded history. Transit crime also decreased by double digits and are at the lowest levels in history, if you remove one year of the pandemic.

We’re making historic strides in making our streets and subways safer, but we know to make New York City the best place to raise a family, we must also make it easier for our children to succeed in schools. Adding more teachers in our schools to provide more individualized care to our students is one of the best ways to help them learn, so

we are hiring 3,700 additional teachers at 750 public schools across the five boroughs for the 2025-2026 school year. The best part of it all: these plans were created by schools for schools — empowering our principals and teachers to create systems that work best for their students so that they can excel.

Our new class sizes are capped at 20 students per grade for grades K-3, 23 students per grade for grades 4-8, 25 students for grades 9-12, and 40 students for performing groups and physical education classes. We are committed to ensuring that, by the coming school year, at least 60 percent of our classes will have these smaller class sizes.

And we are announcing the extra funding early so that principals have enough time to hire quality teachers, and plan for the school year that starts this fall.

Safe and clean streets, thriving neighborhoods, bustling transportation systems, and schools where children can get the attention they need so they can learn — these are the things our administration is delivering to New Yorkers every day, everywhere.



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Home Buying in Harlem Be Prepared to Buy Now

Several prospective first-time home buyers have expressed their discouragement over the lack of available affordable housing in Harlem. This continues to be the number one obstacle to becoming a homeowner. This barrier appears insurmountable, and many prospective buyers are now ready to give up on their dream of homeownership simply because they are discovering the home buying process is too overwhelming.

I have stated many times during my workshops that for most first-time buyers the home buying process will be extremely difficult to successfully complete. But do not get discouraged. Do not quit. Do not retreat. You must be willing to do whatever it takes to overcome every obstacle thrown at you. Allow nothing to disrupt your goal of homeownership.

The statistical data points out that only about 10% of

those wanting to buy a home will be able to successfully complete the process. Those who can complete the process display a great deal of desire. They are tired of paying their landlord's mortgage. They desire to create a better quality of life for their family. This desire becomes so strong that it motivates them to push past all the heartache and setbacks they encounter.

Those who succeed have learned to create a personal purchasing plan. If you fail to plan, then you plan to fail. However, if you have a good plan in place and follow the steps that are taught in the home buying seminar, you can achieve your dream of becoming a homeowner. Here are some suggestions to assist you: (1) be ready when an opportunity becomes available. You must have your money saved. You will be able to get a jump on the competition if you already have a pre-approval from your lender. Real estate agents will know you are serious about completing the process.

(2) Maintain a healthy credit score. Aim to get a score over 700. Use your credit wisely. Keep your balance below 30% of the maximum limit. Remember

lenders want to see 24-month clean credit history with at least 3-4 active accounts. Some lenders will use non-traditional credit such as rent receipts, utility bills etc. if your credit history alone does not meet this requirement.

(3) Expand your search. If you are not finding available affordable properties within the Harlem community, you may need to consider looking into other boroughs. Continue to focus on properties in Harlem just in case something within your price range becomes available.

(4) Stay in contact with your real estate agent and housing counselor. They can inform you whenever any new housing opportunities are available. Keep a constant watch on the housing websites especially Zillow, Street Easy and Trulia. Stay focused. Maintain a positive attitude throughout the process and you will be successful.

Michelle Obama: I'm Choosing Me By Stacy M. Brown, NNPA

Former First Lady Michelle Obama is setting the record straight about her marriage, brushing off rumors of a split from former President Barack Obama and calling out the sexist assumptions that fueled them. In part two of her appearance on the “Work in Progress” podcast hosted by Sophia Bush, Michelle Obama addressed the online speculation that ramped up earlier this year when Barack Obama appeared alone at several high-profile events, including the funeral for former President Jimmy Carter and the inauguration of Donald Trump. Critics quickly jumped to conclusions — but Michelle Obama made it clear that her choices had nothing to do with marital

discord. “This year people couldn’t even fathom that I was making a choice for myself,” Obama said. “They had to assume that my husband and I are divorcing. This couldn’t be a grown woman just making a set of decisions for herself, right?”

She added, “That’s what society does to us. We start actually finally going, What am I doing? Who am I doing this for? And if it doesn’t fit into the stereotype of what people think we should do, then it gets labeled as something negative and horrible.” The best-selling author and former First Lady, who spent eight years in the White House without scandal — unless one counts Barack Obama’s infamous tan suit — said

her efforts to make room for her voice and decisions have often been misinterpreted. “I feel like it’s time for me to make some big girl decisions about my life and own it fully,” she said. “Because if not now, when? What am I waiting for? Look, the summers are—we’re in the summer countdown at 61, right? It’s not so tragic if something happens to you and you’re 80. So now is the time for me to start asking myself these hard questions of who do I truly want to be every day?” Michelle also spoke about the discomfort women often feel when asserting themselves. “When I say ‘no,’ for the most part, people are like, ‘I get it,’ and I’m OK,” she said. “That’s the thing that we, as wom-

en, I think we struggle with — disappointing people.”

Despite the rumor mill, the Obamas have continued to share affectionate public messages. On Valentine’s Day, Barack posted a photo with Michelle, writing, “Thirty-two years together, and you still take my breath away.” Michelle echoed the sentiment in her post: “If there’s one person I can always count on, it’s you, @BarackObama. You’re my rock. Always have been. Always will be.” The couple met in 1988 at a Chicago law firm. Michelle, a 25-year-old Harvard Law graduate, was assigned to mentor Barack, then a summer associate finishing law school. They married in 1992 and have two daughters, Malia, 26, and



Sasha, 23. Many on social media, especially in Black communities, were quick to ridicule the divorce rumors, pointing out that the Obamas — whose biggest scandal was wearing a tan suit — are still treated with more suspicion than Donald

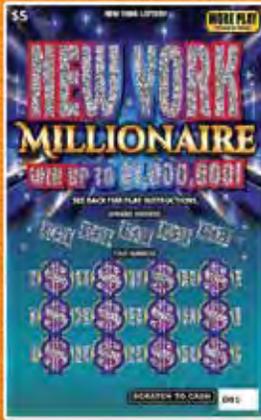

50 or Older? The Pneumococcal Pneumonia Vaccine is Recommended for You (StatePoint)

Pneumococcal pneumonia is a potentially serious bacterial lung disease that can disrupt your life for weeks and even land you in the hospital. Medical experts want you to know that there are steps you can take to reduce your risk of serious illness.

An important step is getting pneumococcal vaccination if it's recommended for you. This vaccine helps protect against pneumococcal disease, including, pneumococcal pneumonia, bloodstream infection (bacteremia), and infection of the lining of the brain and spinal cord (meningitis). In October 2024, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated its adult immunization sched-

ules, and now recommends pneumococcal vaccination for all adults 50 or older, even if you are healthy, and maintains its recommendation of vaccination for adults 19-49 with certain underlying medical conditions like asthma, COPD, chronic heart disease and diabetes.

“The immune system naturally weakens with age, so even if you're healthy and active, being older puts you at greater risk of severe illness from pneumococcal pneumonia. The CDC's updated guidelines are intended to keep more people healthy and safe,” says Albert A. Rizzo, MD, chief medical officer for the American Lung Association.

The American Lung Association maintains an ongoing educational program about pneumococcal pneumonia with Pfizer. As part of the program, they are sharing these fast facts:

- Anyone can get pneumococcal pneumonia and unfortunately, it is a disease you can have more than one time. Certain populations are at higher risk for severe illness, hospitalization and death. You can use American Lung Association resources to help you determine your risk.
- The symptoms of pneumococcal pneumonia include fever, chills, cough, chest pain, difficulty breathing or rapid breathing, and these symptoms can appear suddenly and without warn-



ing.

• Having the flu increases the likelihood of developing pneumonia, including pneumococcal pneumonia. You can reduce this risk by getting a flu shot every year to help prevent seasonal influenza. In addition, those at risk

for pneumococcal disease can get vaccinated against pneumococcal pneumonia. Ask your healthcare provider about pneumococcal vaccination today.

At least 10 million Africans were enslaved and transported to Europe and the Americas between the 15th and 19th centuries. Portuguese, Dutch, English, Spanish and French ships ruled the sea and developed the Atlantic slave trade, the transatlantic slave trade, and the Euro-American slave trade.

Africans not only built the economic foundation that allowed America to become the most powerful country in the world, but they also helped build the economies of every European power that benefited from free African slave labor.

A great number of the 10 million African slaves who were shipped to America came through Goree Island in Senegal and The Cape Coast Castle in Ghana. The British Dutch, Danes and Portuguese were the colonizers in Ghana, the main countries involved in the slave trade. In 2023 HTB

took several people to Senegal and the visit to Goree Island was an emotional but an important part of the trip. It allowed the visitors to reconnect with their ancestors.

In December 2025 HTB will take about 20 people to Ghana for the annual Cultural Oneness Festival in Northern Ghana and part of the travel itinerary will allow visitors to visit the slave castle in Cape Coast. I am sure like Goree Island the tour will be emotional, but an important part of returning home to pay homage to our ancestors.

The African Diaspora is a sleeping giant. African and Caribbean Americas alone spend over one trillion dollars a year for goods and services even during COVID. It would be difficult to calculate the amount of money

the global African Diaspora spends on goods and services in one year.

Thanks to the transatlantic slave trade industry, the African Diaspora is truly a powerful sleeping giant. If this giant awakens and realizes it is African, and the motherland is the richest continent on earth, imagine the possibilities of coming full circle 1400 to 2025 about 625 years.

The social programming of the African Diaspora by their colonizers over the past 625 years has been very effective in keeping the African diaspora divided. In 2019 Ghana developed a home coming marketing initiative to encourage members of the African diaspora to come home.

Many African and Caribbean Americans travel to

Ghana, for pleasure and to explore business opportunities. Some even applied for dual citizenship and purchased property.

COVID slowed travel especially to Africa and countries outside of America. The Cultural Oneness Festival is one of the many events developed to revise the initiative to encourage travel to Ghana for business, culture and pleasure.

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Poetry Books by various authors

A, B, B, A.

That's not only how you spell the name of a popular music group. That's also how a poem might be structured, if it rhymes, or it might be created in other ways. That's the thing about poetry: it's all how you perceive it when creating it and reading it. So why not think about putting these great poetry books on your shelf this month...?

When you spend time with poetry, you expect a certain kind of relationship between author and reader. That's only part of what you get in **"The Space Between Men"** by Mia S. Willis (Penguin Poets, \$20). It might also change the way you feel.

Here, Willis – a poet, historian, and educator – explores culture, Black history, and what it's like to be Black, Southern, and queer. When those various experiences come together in poetry here, it invites readers to consider the width and depth of the spaces, and their mere existence.

If short but image-fueled poetry appeals to you, this book is worth a good look.

Poetry can take your thoughts in many directions, including thoughts about yourself. If you're hungry for soul-searching, then try **"Is This My Final Form?"** by Amy Gerstler (Penguin Poets, \$20).

Life doesn't follow a straight line. Some things are two things at once and situations can change, which are two points that seem to be everywhere inside this book. Is this a series of biographical poems with a twist of imagination, or are the poems in here a collection of new perceptions and ways to embrace what could be? Read, and think about it because it's up for a reader's interpretation. However you perceive these poems, you may chuckle sometimes. For sure, you'll want to read them again and think anew.

And finally, if your child loves the beauty of poetry and wonders how to create poems, then **"The One and Only Rumi"** by Rabiah York, illustrated by Maneli Manouchehri (Penguin, \$18.99) is a book to bring to the table.

Here, children will learn the story of Muhammad, a wise young boy whose life changed when Genghis Khan came to his village. Muhammad was only allowed to fill a bag with possessions and he knew he'd miss the birds and the friends he'd made at home. His father said it was unlikely that they'd ever return.

Yes, there were other birds and other friends in his lifetime, but Muhammad never forgot the first ones and "he never stopped listening" to the wind or the sound of the leaves or the laughter of others. He grew to become a man, a teacher, and a poet, as your 8-to-12-year-old will see in this beautifully illustrated, beautiful-

ly told book.

If these collections about poetry and life don't quite fit what you need, be sure to ask your favorite bookseller or librarian for more. They can help you find poetry, silly rhymes, great biographies, and collections of verse that are perfect volumes with which to spend hours. In the meantime, give these poetry books an "A."
