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PONDER THIS! Never Forget the Stigma Behind the Name

Names matter when they deny the rights of others. If you do not believe names matter or there is no power in a name, look at the history of Jim Crow, a fictitious character created by Thomas Dartmouth Rice, a white stage actor in the 1830s.

According to accounts, Rice had observed traditional black songs and

dances in his travels through the southern slave states. In one of the towns, Rice watched an elderly Black man performing a song and prance routine for his own amusement as he was cleaning a stable.

Rice studied the man, learned to imitate his every move, and with extreme exaggerations added, he took his choreographed comedic characterization to the stage. As the story was told, Crow was a white man who owned the Black man and the stable and Jim was the name Thomas Rice gave to the Black man to amuse his white audiences.

The highlight of the staged performance by Rice gave credence through entertainment to racist stereotypes of Black people. His success

helped popularize the use of the blackface minstrel format.

Additionally, whites began using the name Jim Crow as a derogatory term on and off stage to describe Black people as buffoons and slow-witted. The slanderous demeaning insinuations aided in the spread of racist overtones North and South in the United States.

After slavery was abolished and minstrel shows began to slowly fade in popularity, the Jim Crow character lived on as a label and a symbol of what southern whites used as a drawback to a life of respect for Black people, freed or not.

Jim Crow connected again as an asset for the JIM CROW LAWS legalizing segregation in local

and state statutes spread around the country. The legal system did not protect Black citizens from white police and judges deciding court cases with the assurance they would be subject to conviction and years of servitude in prisons.

Laws have made changes in systems that we thought would never happen, yet others may never get on the books. We must not forget the humiliation put upon us. Never forget the strength and endurance that our people had to hold onto in the more than four hundred years of cruelty and blatant disregard for human life in the long hard struggle to be free.

May the spirit of our ancestors keep us grounded and committed to

teaching our children that they are beautiful, smart, and able to rise to remarkable success and stature.

No, we will not, and we cannot go back. No matter how they try to erase our amazing accomplishments, and ban our stories, we know that America was not great in the years of dehumanization of slaves, or the humiliation of Jim Crow. And still, we rise!

In 1992, INDIA made a pivotal shift to salsa, collaborating with Eddie Palmieri on the album Llegó La India via Eddie Palmieri, which marked her breakthrough in the genre. Two years later, she released Dicen Que Soy (1994), a quadruple platinum album that featured the beloved duet "Vivir Lo Nuestro" with Marc Anthony.

Standing in Solidarity with our Dominican Community

OP EDITORIAL

The Dominican community in New York City is the largest anywhere in the world outside of the Dominican Republic — we are their home away from home. Dominican New Yorkers contribute to every facet of life across the five boroughs, whether it's running our small businesses in the Bronx or playing in our sports stadiums in Manhattan and Queens. Dominicans are not just our neighbors and our friends. They are our family.

So, when our family suffers a tragedy, it is our responsibility to be there for our brothers and sisters in their sorrow and in their

grief. Two weeks ago, when the roof of the Jet Set nightclub collapsed, at least 231 members of our Dominican family lost their lives, and more than 150 more were injured in the accident. Last week, in a sign of solidarity, I mourned with their families in Santo Domingo not merely as the mayor of New York City, but as a brother who felt their pain.

The night of the roof collapse was a painful moment for so many within our city, and I knew I could not just show my support from a distance. I was honored to meet with the first responders who risked their lives and rushed to the rescue. I visited the site of the Jet Set nightclub and left a wreath as a symbol of my love for the people of the Dominican Republic. And I spoke with the families and community members who were impacted, including the loved ones of a retired NYPD detective who died, because their

loss is our loss too.

I also met with leaders of the Dominican Republic — its president, Luis Abinader, and the minister of public works and communications, Eduardo Estrella — because I wanted to offer our support and see how New York City can aid with the country's recovery efforts. The NYPD already has an intelligence outpost in the Dominican Republic that is helping in any way they can. And I offered my own personal assistance to do everything possible to prevent something like this from happening again. We owe that to those we lost.

As a man of faith in a country of faith, my final stop was to attend mass with the archbishop, Monsignor Francisco Ozoria, at San Antonio de Padua Church. Facing darkness in the aftermath of this tragedy, I prayed that the unity of our spirit can be the light that will turn our pain into purpose. Because together, we will

overcome it.

The links between our two communities are never stronger than in the wake of catastrophe. It was true in the past, from the destruction left by Hurricane Fiona to the fatalities of Flight 587, and it is true now. What I saw during my trip — the remarkable vitality of the Dominican people in spite of loss, their love for life and unwavering spirit surfacing above sadness — can also be found here in New York City, a place where almost 1 million Dominicans call home.

Today, every New Yorker carries part of the Dominican Republic in their heart. Both of our people understand tragedy, but we're also tough and we never give up. Psalm 147 says: "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds." God bless those we have lost and God bless the survivors. Our hearts are broken but our hearts are also with you.



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Home Buying in Harlem Be Prepared to Buy Now

I do not recall ever seeing the housing market this competitive. Prices are literally exploding and are practically out of reach for prospective low to moderate income home buyers. We were hoping that the higher interest rates would significantly lower the market values, but that simply has not been the case. The home prices for a home in Harlem are still very expensive. What this means for those now entering the housing market is there is little affordable property available.

For prospective first-time buyers, you must now face the unavoidable truth that you cannot afford to own property in Harlem. This is a sad but apparently true statement. Many Harlem residents have been priced out of the housing market. You are now being forced to make a difficult decision. You must

either continue to pay rent for an apartment that provides no investment return or look to other areas of the city to purchase a home. Neither of these choices are ideal, if your goal is to become a homeowner in Harlem.

However, here are some other viable solutions to consider if you want to make buying a home in Harlem a reality: (1) buy with family members or trusted friends. There is an old saying about "strength in numbers." If you cannot afford to purchase a home on your income alone, seek to establish a business partnership with one or two family members. Combine your income and assets together.

Make sure everyone is on board with this idea and is committed to becoming a homeowner. They also must be willing to pay their share of the mortgage payment. With the additional income from the other family members, your pre-approval amount will probably be sufficient for making a purchase on a three or four family brownstone.

You can have up to five individual names on a mortgage application. There is one potential problem with

this arrangement and that is everyone must have a solid credit score. The bank will take the middle credit score from the three major bureaus - Experian, Trans Union, and Equifax.

I know of several situations where family members have pooled their resources to successfully purchase a home. Just make sure your attorney has covered all the legalities of the contract to protect your investment for buying a home together.

(2) Another option that is growing in popularity is the rent to own arrangement. I used to be extremely skeptical of these programs because there is a high tendency of it being a scam. Be careful when entering into this type of agreement. Make sure all the contractual terms are spelled out. Have your attorney review the contract with you before signing. Remember you will still need to be pre-approved for the purchase.

Yolanda Adams, currently starring in BET's Kingdom Business, is

one of the best-selling gospel artists of all time, having sold 10 million albums worldwide. Her career began as a singer with Houston's Southeast Inspirational Choir after years of being a school teacher. After signing to the label Sounds of Gospel, her debut album, *Just as I Am*, was released in 1987. In 1999, her breakout album, *Mountain High, Valley Low* was released. The album was a platinum-selling success, which helped launch her career. After the release of her 2011 album *Becoming*, Adams took a break to explore being a radio host until 2016. Yolanda Adams made a great return to music in 2024 with her comeback, *Sunny Days*. She has won multiple awards, including four Grammy Awards, four Dove Awards, five BET Awards, six NAACP Image Awards, six Soul Train Music Awards, two BMI Awards, and sixteen Stellar Awards. Adams was also the first Gospel artist to be awarded an American Music Award.

Shirley Caesar, known as the First Lady of Gospel, began her professional music career in 1958 at the age of nineteen. From a young age, she began singing at local churches to help bring money into her household for her family. Caesar became a traveling performer with evangelist Leroy Johnson before signing a record deal for a single for Federal Records, *I'd Rather Have Jesus* in 1951. Shirley Caesar was

a part of the celebrated female gospel group the Caravans for several years before going solo in 1961 with her single *Hallelujah, It's Done*. In 2000, she was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame. Caesar performed for former President Barack Obama and Michelle Obama at the White House, and, in 2016, was awarded a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. She is the recipient of Eleven Grammy Awards, fourteen Stellar Awards, and fifteen Dove Awards.

Dorinda Clark Cole is a Grammy Award-winning gospel singer, songwriter, musician, talk show host, and evangelist. She began singing at just 5 years old in church with her sisters. Best known as a member of the family vocal group The Clark Sisters and as a daughter of pioneering choral director Mattie Moss Clark. In 2002, her debut solo album, which included one of her biggest hits, *I'm Coming Out* was released. Dorinda Clark Cole also put out hits like *Take it Back* in 2008 and *Living It* in 2015. Her first release in nearly a decade, *Great and Mighty*, was released in 2023. As a member of The Clark Sisters, she has won two Grammy Awards.

Karen Clark Sheard is the youngest member of gospel group, the Clark Sisters, which was formed in 1973. She began singing in church with her sisters when she was 7 years old. Also



the mother of contemporary gospel singer and actress Kierra "Kiki" Sheard, with whom she frequently collaborates. Throughout her career, Karen Clark Sheard has released five solo albums and seventeen with the Clark Sisters. During the hiatus of the Clark Sisters, she recorded her debut studio album *Finally Karen* (1997), which spawned the single, *Balm in Gilead*. Finally Karen was among the highest-selling gospel albums of that year, and earned her a Grammy Award nomination and a Soul Train Lady of Soul

Award for "Best Female Vocalist". After a scary near-death experience, Karen Clark Sheard was inspired to write *2nd Chance*, her second album. The 2023 Clark Sister Reunion Tour then inspired her 2024 album *Still Karen*.

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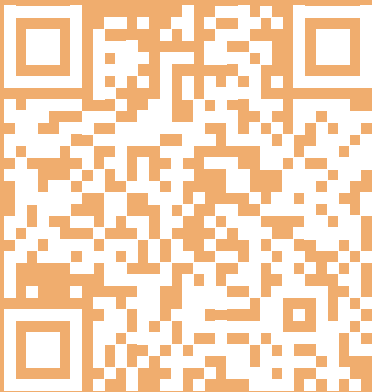


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Manna's Restaurant Provides Scholarship Funds to Five College Bound Students

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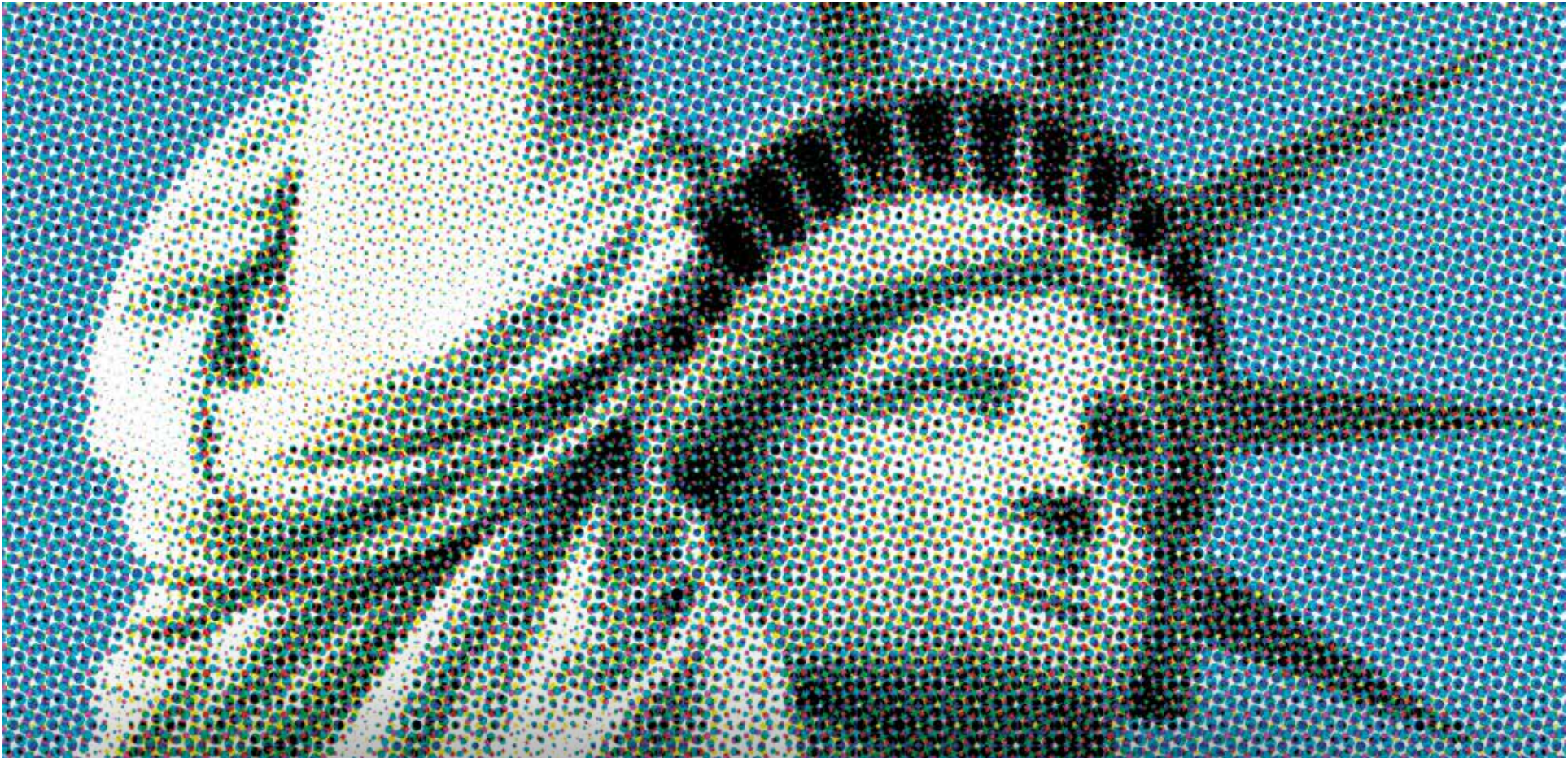

Unexpected Sparks: How a Harlem Native Paved Her Path in Electronics

This is the third article in our five-part series celebrating Women in STEAM sectors. When we envision careers in technology, our minds often jump to the familiar roles of help desk technicians, software engineers, or cybersecurity experts, but this field is far more diverse.

For Harlem native Toni Robinson, a STEAM career wasn't part of her early as-

pirations. Growing up and attending Roberto Clemente Performing Arts Middle School, I.S. 195, her focus was on dance. However, her mother encouraged her to keep all options open, recognizing technology's growing importance and suggesting fields like engineering. This advice resonated when Toni considered high school, leading her to include Chelsea Vocational High School in her top choices, despite not being her first pick. This seemingly small decision would unexpectedly launch her electronics career.

At Chelsea High School, Toni was one of only two girls in Electronics and felt like a fish out of water. Initially, she wanted to join the

other girls in the Business major, but her experience in shop class took an unexpected turn. She began to excel, consistently outperforming her male counterparts. This success sparked a realization of her aptitude. She recognized the advantage of her meticulous approach, problem-solving skills, and steady hands. As Toni puts it, "Electronics was a door I didn't expect to enter, but when I came across that threshold, there was no stopping me!"

Technology became her focus, and her dedication paid off. Upon graduation, she secured an apprenticeship with the New York City Transit Authority (MTA), a program designed to recruit young talent in

various trades. Though initially apprehensive, Toni recognized the immense opportunity and worked diligently while simultaneously pursuing Electromechanical Engineering at CUNY's New York City College of Technology. These were demanding years, but she was fueled by determination. After her three-year apprenticeship, she became a full-time Revenue Equipment Maintainer. In a department of over 250, only five were women. Her role involved maintaining and repairing electronic equipment in train stations across New York City, contributing to technological advancements like the shift from tokens to MetroCards.

After 18 years, Toni advanced to an Electronics Specialist role at the MTA's Central Electronics shop, repairing equipment for buses, trains, and communication systems. After five years in that position, she joined NJ Transit as a Principal Technical Specialist, overseeing vehicle monitoring for private contract carrier bus fleets.

Throughout her journey, Toni's entrepreneurial spirit blossomed. She founded Stilettos & Screwdrivers LLC, an electronics mobile repair company that has evolved into a firm helping tech professionals advance their careers while advocating for women of color in the industry.

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"LOVE, RITA: An American Story of Sisterhood, Joy, Loss, and Legacy" By Bridgett M. Davis

Take care. Do it because you want to stay well, upright, away from illness. Eat right, swallow your vitamins and hydrate, keep good habits and hygiene, and cross your fingers. Take care as much as you can because, as in the new book, "Love, Rita" by Bridgett M. Davis, your well-being is sometimes out of your hands.

It was a family story told often: when Bridgett Davis was born, her sister, Rita, then four years old, stormed up to her crying newborn sibling and said, 'Shut your... mouth!' Rita, says Davis, didn't want a little sister then. She already had two big sisters

and a neighbor who was somewhat of a "sister," and this baby was an irritation. As Davis grew, the feeling was mutual, although she always knew that Rita loved her. Over the years, the sisters tried many times not to fight – on their own and at the urging of their mother – and though division was ever present, it eased when Rita went to college. Davis was still in high school then, and she admired her big sister. She eagerly devoured frequent letters sent to her in the mail, signed, "Love, Rita." When Davis was in college herself, Rita was diagnosed with lupus, a disease of the immune system that often left her constantly

tired and sore. Davis was a bit unfazed, but sympathetic to Rita's suffering and also annoyed that the disease sometimes came between them. By that time, they needed one another more than ever. First, they lost their father. Drugs then invaded the family and addiction stole two siblings. A sister and a young nephew were murdered in a domestic violence incident. Their mother was devastated; Rita's lupus was an "added weight of her sorrow."

After their mother died of colon cancer, Rita's lupus took a turn for the worse. "Did she even stand a chance?" Davis wrote in her journal.

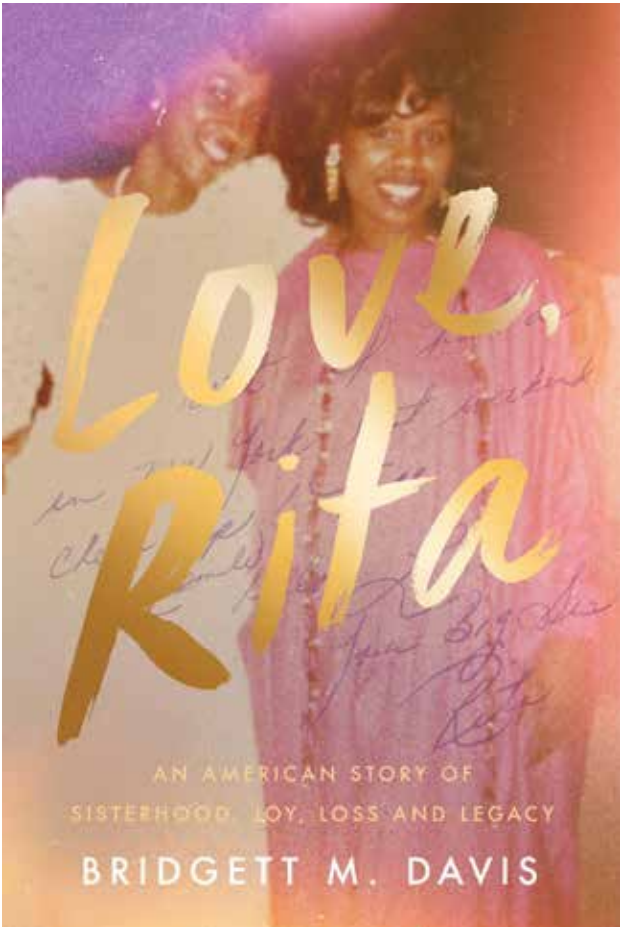
"It just didn't seem possible that she, someone so full of life, could die." Let's start here: once you get past the prologue in "Love, Rita," you may lose interest. *Maybe.*

Most of the stories that author Bridgett M. Davis shares are mildly interesting, nothing rare, mostly commonplace tales of growing up in the 1960s and '70s with a sibling. There are a lot of these kinds of stories and they tend to generally melt together. After about fifty pages of them, you might start to think about putting the book aside.

But don't. Not quite yet. In between those everyday tales, Davis occasionally writes about being an ailing Black woman in America, the incorrect assumptions made by doctors, the history of medical treatment for Black people (women in particular), attitudes, and mythologies. Those passages are now-

and-then, interspersed, but worth scanning for. This book is perhaps best for anyone with the patience for a slow-paced memoir, or anyone who loves a Black woman who's ill or might be ill someday. If that's you and you can read between the lines, then "Love, Rita" is a book to take carefully.
