Harlem’s pulse beats with reflection and resolve this week as the National Urban League’s 2025 State of Black America report declares a “State of Emergency” for Black America. The report, unveiled in Cleveland, warns of sweeping rollbacks to civil rights, voting protections, and diversity initiatives under the current administration. Urban League President Marc Morial calls for “vigilance, mobilization, and solidarity,” urging communities to defend democracy and equity. (see pg 3)

National Urban League Declares “State of Emergency” for Black America in 2025 Report

In its most urgent warning to date, the National Urban League has declared a “state of emergency” for democracy and civil rights in the United States. The organization’s 49th annual State of Black America report, unveiled at its conference in Cleveland, Ohio, outlines what it describes as a deliberate, coordinated campaign to reverse decades of progress for Black Americans. “A democracy willing to destroy itself rather than deliver justice is a democracy in crisis,” the report states. “The work is difficult. The road is long,” National Urban League President Marc H. Morial added. “But we know from experience that the arc of history does not bend toward justice on its own—it must be bent by those with the strength and will to see it through.”

This year’s report, titled “State of Emergency: Democracy, Civil Rights, and Progress Under Attack,” sounds the alarm over efforts to dismantle civil rights protections, suppress voting access, and strip away diversity initiatives. “The notion that we are living through a ‘state of emergency’ is not rhetorical flourish. It is an honest reckoning with a government increasingly determined to sacrifice its founding principles—equality, liberty, and justice—rather than accept the truth of a diversifying nation and deliver equitable opportunity to all,” Morial wrote in his foreword. Among the most pressing threats detailed in the report is the systemat-

ic rollback of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

“Almost daily, since January 20, 2025, the federal government, at the direction of the White House, has set fire to policies and entire departments dedicated to protecting civil and human rights, providing access to an equal education, fair housing, safe and effective healthcare, and ensuring that our democratic process is adhered to across the nation,” the report authors wrote. It also describes the radical transformation of the U.S. Department of Justice’s Civil Rights Division. “Under its new leadership, the Civil Rights Division has been hollowed out and repurposed, transforming from a guardian of justice into a tool for political retribution,” the report said. Within weeks of the new administration taking power, “cases against election deniers who’ve tampered with the election equipment were dismissed and January 6th rioters were pardoned.”

The report also warns of a rise in digital extremism. “During the 2024 election cycle, accounts supporting progressive candidates also saw their accounts blocked and shadow-banned without explanation,” the report documented. It calls this “a digital rollback of rights mirroring what’s happening in courts and legislatures.” Describing the coordinated backlash against diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) efforts, the report stated: “Following the murder of George Floyd, far-right extremists seized an opportunity to stop the calls for racial equity by reframing the policies as

‘woke’ and anti-American.” The American Alliance for Equal Rights, led by Edward Blum, “continued its assault on organizations with ‘unfair,’ ‘race-based’ diversity and equity programs.” In one high-profile case, the group sued the Fearless Fund, “forcing it to suspend its \$20,000 grant program for women of color entrepreneurs, claiming ‘anti-white’ bias.”

The National Urban League’s response, detailed in the report, includes a broad campaign of legal challenges, advocacy, and community organizing. It has launched the Equitable Justice and Strategic Initiatives division, established the 21 Pillars for Public Safety framework, and coordinated the Fair Budget Coalition to push for a “just and inclusive FY2026 federal budget.” The League also filed suit, alongside Lambda Legal and the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, challenging executive orders that target diversity and equity. “This is not business as usual,” Morial said. “This is an emergency. The National Urban League urges vigilance, mobilization, solidarity, and support. This year’s State of Black America is a call to action to stand together as we defend our rights and the principles of American democracy in our courts, our communities, and our coalitions.”

Contributors to the report include civil rights leaders, attorneys, and elected officials such as Damon Hewitt, Kristen Clarke, Janai Nelson, LaTosha Brown, U.S. Representatives Steven Horsford and Hakeem Jeffries, and



others committed to defending democracy. “We are witnessing something more than policy shifts. We are watching an attempt to turn back the clock to an era when the full humanity of

all Americans was not recognized—when the idea of true equality was treated as a threat to the social order,” the report authors concluded. “What we face today is a deliberate, coordinated

effort to deny the future of a more just and inclusive America.”

PONDER THIS! Touching is Illegal in New York State

As of June 5th, there is a new “No Touch” law in [New York State](#). If you break this law, you could face some big fines. I know what you’re thinking, did that and done that process of no touching when COVID came to town and social distancing was mandated.

The “No Touching” is about technology and screens while driving, not avoiding contact with other human beings. The new law, also known as the hands-free law, makes it illegal to touch your phone or any other smart device when driving your vehicle.

That means even if you are stopped in traffic or at a red light, you could get fined if you pick up your phone to look at directions or send a text. The best and safest action would be to pull over, then pursue whatever is the most important messages or calls to take care of on your devices.

New York State, along with 30 other states in America, passed the new law back on June 5th, 2025.

In December 2001,

Albany banned handheld calls while driving. Eight years later lawmakers added texting, emailing, and scrolling. Today the first ticket runs \$50 to \$200, plus a \$93 surcharge and five DMV points. A third strike within eighteen months can draw a fine as high as \$450 and raise insurance coverage.

That attempt to keep drivers from using devices while driving has not solved the ongoing dilemma of the distraction crisis. NHTSA counted 3,275 deaths and nearly 325,000 injuries nationwide last year that involved a distracted driver. It has been reported that New York wrote more than 90,000 tickets for electronic device violations in 2024.

I had a recent confron-

tation with the driver of the Access A Ride vehicle, in which I was travelling. He was consistently having conversations holding his cell phone. Hard as I tried, my stress about his possible distraction of talking while driving made it necessary for me to confront him about it.

His excuse was that he needed to get information, and his mounted phone holder was broken. I told him the condition of his mounted holder was not my concern, but rather the possibility of his distraction while driving. He decided to do the right thing – pull into a parking spot and handle his business.

There are drivers who know the law and may still take the chance of making a

call or texting while driving, holding the device. Do not feel that you must go along with whatever the driver of any car service wants to do behind the wheel. If they are holding the cell phone or device in their hand while driving, the law is on your side.

Your destination is important; however, a dangerous, haphazard journey is not what you are paying for. Speak up before it is too late.



The Most Pro-Housing Administration in City History

Ask any young person, senior citizen, or working-class New Yorker about the biggest issues facing our city and you'll hear the same response: affordable housing. When our administration came into office, we were clear that our city could not afford to keep kicking the can down the road on housing; it was not enough to tinker around the edges of our housing crisis, and we could not pass the buck off to a future administration. We had to undertake ambitious initiatives to build hundreds of thousands of new homes as soon as possible — and that is exactly what we have done for three years.

From the Bronx to Staten

Island, across every borough and neighborhood in New York City, our administration has created record amounts of affordable housing year after year. We passed the first citywide zoning reform in 60 years to build a little more housing in every neighborhood and advanced five ambitious neighborhood plans to scrap outdated zoning in neighborhoods like Jamaica and Bronx Metro North. Rezoning is the lever that moves the boulders of bureaucracy out of the way, especially when it comes to building new housing. That is why our rezoning strategy has been such a success, helping clear the way to create an incredible 130,000 new homes across the five boroughs — more than all the rezonings under the Bloomberg and de Blasio administrations combined.

Because of these historic efforts, we are proud to call ourselves the most pro-housing administration in city history.

But our administration is not going to rest on these accomplishments. We are con-

tinuing to commit ourselves to the fight for more housing on every block, in every neighborhood, and across every borough.

This past week alone, we brought hundreds of new homes across the city closer to reality. In Brownsville, we advanced our ambitious Brownsville Arts Center & Apartments project to create 283 new homes and a 28,000 square-foot state of the art cultural center. On the Lower East Side, we helped finance 190 affordable rental apartments for seniors with extra social services, outdoor spaces, and specialized amenities to support our older New Yorkers and help them remain in the city they have contributed so much to. And in Clinton Hill, we announced the redevelopment of 103 supportive and affordable homes that will help parents living with serious mental illness or substance use disorder reunite with their children and build their futures together.

But we didn't stop there either. In East New York, we broke ground on the first phase of the "Innovative Ur-

ban Village," which will create over 2,000 new homes, build a fresh food grocery store, and deliver social services, child care, and more. All of these projects are not just about creating new housing; they are about creating a holistic community that cares for and uplifts our fellow New Yorkers.

Previous administrations have talked about tackling our housing crisis, but our administration has gotten it done. These four projects are just the latest examples of the work we are doing every day to reach our moonshot goal of 500,000 new homes for New Yorkers by 2032.

When it comes to building new housing, New Yorkers deserve nothing less than an administration that thinks outside the box and pursues every avenue and opportunity to build, redevelop, and convert city spaces into homes. That is the more affordable city we are delivering, each and every day, as we continue to make New York City the best place to live and raise a family.

“Malcolm-Jamal Warner, Beloved Star of The Cosby Show,” Dies at 54

Malcolm-Jamal Warner, the actor best known for his role as Theo Huxtable on the groundbreaking NBC sitcom The Cosby Show, has died at the age of 54. Warner reportedly drowned while on a family vacation in Costa Rica, according to a family source cited by People magazine. His death was confirmed on Sunday, July 21. Warner’s sudden passing has stunned fans and colleagues alike. He is survived by his wife and daughter, whose identities have been kept private throughout his career. Authorities in Costa Rica have not released additional details, but Warner’s death is being described as a tragic accident.

Warner became a household name in the 1980s as the wisecracking middle child of Cliff and Clair Huxtable on The Cosby Show, one of the most successful and influential sitcoms in television history. His portrayal of Theo earned him an Emmy nomination and endeared him to millions of viewers during the show’s eight-season run from 1984 to 1992. After The Cosby Show, Warner continued to build a diverse and acclaimed career. He starred in the UPN sitcom Malcolm & Eddie from 1996 to 2000, and held recurring roles in numerous TV dramas and comedies, includ-

ing Major Crimes, Suits, Community, The Resident, Reed Between the Lines, Jeremiah, and 9-1-1. He also voiced “The Producer” on the popular animated series The Magic School Bus and served as an executive producer on the show.

Warner’s talents extended well beyond acting. In 2015, he won a Grammy Award for Best Traditional R&B Performance for his work on the song “Jesus Children” with Robert Glasper Experiment and Lalah Hathaway. He was also a published poet, musician, and director, and in recent years had become an outspoken advocate for mental health, par-

ticularly in the Black community. Just days before his death, Warner released what would be his final episode of his podcast Not All Hood, a series focused on unpacking generational trauma, wellness, and healing within marginalized communities.

Fans and celebrities flooded social media on Sunday, expressing shock and heartbreak. One longtime fan, 43-year-old Jalen Cooper of Washington, D.C., said, “He was more than Theo to us—he represented a generation of young Black men who finally saw themselves reflected on TV. His voice will be missed.” Warner’s endur-



ing presence in American pop culture spanned four decades, and he remained active in film, television, music, and podcasting until his final days. As tributes continue to pour in from across the entertainment industry and beyond, many are remembering Warner as a trailblazer who helped

redefine Black manhood on screen. Actor and director Keegan-Michael Key posted simply, “Rest easy, King. You gave us more than you know.”

Warner’s family has asked for privacy during this time of grief. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made public.

Black Americans Still Face Deep Retirement Gaps Despite Higher Incomes

A report from the Employee Benefit Research Institute shows that Black Americans continue to face serious challenges in saving for retirement, even as their incomes grow.

The 2025 Retirement Confidence Survey, which included a special oversample of Black workers and retirees, found that the wealth gap remains wide at every income level. Among households earning \$75,000 or more, only 33% of Black Americans reported having \$250,000 or more in savings and investments, compared with 63% of non-Black Americans. Debt re-

mains a significant barrier. 63% of higher-income Black households said debt is a problem, while just 45% of non-Black households at the same income level said the same. Nearly half of upper-income Black respondents said debt affects their ability to save or live comfortably in retirement.

While many Black Americans expressed confidence managing day-to-day budgets, fewer felt prepared to invest or plan for the long term. The study showed that Black Americans with higher incomes were less likely to have personally saved for retirement, 77%, com-

pared with 87% of non-Black Americans. Retirement experiences also differed sharply. Forty-four percent of Black retirees said they retired earlier than planned because of a health problem or disability, compared with 32% of non-Black retirees. After leaving their main jobs, Black retirees were more likely to work for pay to make ends meet, and more often said their retirement lifestyle was worse than expected. Access to financial advice and planning remains uneven. Just 31% of Black respondents reported currently working with a financial advisor, although

nearly half expect to do so in the future. Black Americans were more likely to seek help with reducing debt, creating wills or estate plans, and arranging life insurance than simply determining if they had saved enough to retire.

Researchers Craig Copeland and Lisa Greenwald wrote, “Black Americans reported disproportionately lower financial resources, and how they feel about retirement and financial security is clearly impacted by having less resources.” They continued, “In particular, Black retirees are struggling with higher likelihoods of their retirement lifestyle being



worse than expected and having to retire earlier than planned because of a health problem or disability.” “Still,” the researchers concluded, “there are some modifications in the financial system that could help improve their prospects, such as increased assistance in balancing competing financial priorities like debt reduction, supporting family, and building long-term savings.”

I believe the best water to drink to maximize your health is ionized alkaline water. On a pH scale from 3.0 to 10, ionized alkaline water is between 9.0 and 10. Most commercial bottled water is in the 5.0pH range; New York tap water is around 7.0 the higher the pH value in your drinking water the better it is for your health.

The best machines will produce the highest pH value of 10 in the ionized alkaline water that they transform from tap water. The reason why the high pH value is so important in preserving health is its ability to reduce the acidity in the body. Excess acids in the body will attack and destroy healthy body tissue, the body protects itself from this by creating fat cells.

Alkaline water can neutralize the acidity of the body and the high pH value in alkaline water will reduce the bodies need to produce fat and cholesterol to protect itself from harmful acids. Most people who drink and cook with ionized alkaline water will experience weight loss another benefit. "Joy Goddess: A'Lelia Walker and the Harlem Renaissance" by A'Lelia Bundles

Mama said. Mama said to be nice to others. Stand up for yourself, she said. You can do whatever you put your mind to. Stay out of trouble. Take care of yourself and those you love. Mama said a lot of things that shaped your life, and in the new book "Joy Goddess" by A'Lelia Bundles, Mama left a huge legacy.

She remembered a time before, and a time after.

In the before, Lelia Walker and her mother had little-to-nothing. Lelia's father had died when she was very young, and it was up to her mother, Sarah, to put food on the table and a roof over their heads with her hard work.

There was simply no room for extras.

In the after – after Sarah had become Madame C.J. Walker, head of a beauty empire that catered to Black women – there was money, mansions, and a certain kind of fame. There was still hard work, too, but Lelia embraced it because she was proud of her mother's acumen – maybe more so, in fact, after Madame made young Lelia a "full partner" with the responsibility to run some of the farther-flung accounts.

It was true that mother and daughter didn't always see eye-to-eye. Because she'd worked away from Madame for years, Lelia felt emboldened to

speak her mind but Madame often shut her down. Lelia wanted to choose her own husband, but Madame let her feelings about the beau be known. They argued fiercely, then acted like there was never any problem. They loved one another, says Bundles, but they were "fire and ice."

Lelia, Bundles says, sought her mother's opinion on all matters, but she didn't often heed her mother's words. Madame didn't like that but as the years passed, she gave more and more of the business up, confident that Lelia (later, A'Lelia) would take care of things – and she was, overseas, as her mother's health began to fail...

Filled with lush word-painted images of opulence and wealth and a sometimes-reverential tone, "Joy Goddess" is a biography that covers a lot of territory: because author A'Lelia Bundles is A'Lelia Walker's great-granddaughter, it's part family history, as well as Black history. It's a business biography, too, in a large way. And it's a love story, pure and simple, one that will appeal to any headstrong mother-daughter pair.


It's that last part that features most strongly and builds to break hearts, even though readers are never unaware of what's to come. Bundles is honest about how the Walker women changed surrounding lives – Madame had "adopted" a daughter with mixed outcome – and how their beauty empire

positively affected Black business and culture for decades but she seems to push racism aside somewhat in the telling here. Instead, Madame and A'Lelia's accomplishments and the world they lived in take front-and-center, and you'll appreciate that.

This is a book for readers who want a wide-reaching biography with hints of inspiration. It'll make a great book club book or mother-and-daughter tale to share. Read "Joy Goddess."




