This week, Harlem bursts into celebration as HARLEM WEEK 2025 kicks off its 51st annual festival under the theme “Celebrate Our Magic.” From August 1–17, there will be many events including Senior Citizens Day (Aug 1), Summer Streets block parties (Aug 2, 9, 16), Climate Change Conference (Aug 6), Uptown Night Market (Aug 7 & 14), and the grand finale HARLEM DAY (Aug 17) featuring three stages of entertainment, global cuisine, and cultural showcases. In a powerful show of unity, the Black Church and Black Press have announced a historic partnership to confront systemic disparities in Black communities. Led by faith leaders and the National Newspaper Publishers Association, the coalition will focus on education, economic equity, and civic engagement, declaring: “When we act as one, we cannot be ignored or denied.” (see page 3)

On August 14, the Harlem Tourism Board will host a Cultural Tourism & Hospitality Conference at the Harlem Renaissance Marriott. The event will spotlight Harlem’s new “City Within a City” campaign and feature a special appearance by His Royal Majesty Buipe Wura Jinapor II of Ghana, who will announce a cultural partnership and receive a ceremonial Key to Harlem. Black Church and Black Press Unite to Empower Black America

In a historic announcement, a coalition of leading Black faith organizations and the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA) unveiled a strategic partnership and plan to confront systemic disparities impacting African American communities nationwide.

Dr. Boise Kimber, President of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.; Bishop J. Drew Sheard, Presiding Bishop of the Church of God in Christ (COGIC); Dr. Samuel Tolbert, President of the National Baptist Convention of America; and Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis Jr., veteran civil rights leader and President of the NNPA, are leading

this collaboration between the Black church and Black Media.

“There is strength in unity. There is power in our collective voice. There is hope in our actions,” said Dr. Boise Kimber.

For generations, African American communities have endured deep-rooted inequities in healthcare, education, criminal justice, economic opportunity, and access to capital. These challenges are not new. The coalition intends to put an end to fragmented responses and speak with one clear, concise and consolidated voice.

The Black Church and Black Media, two institutions that have long anchored and up-

lifted Black America, are now coming together with renewed focus and purpose.

This partnership is grounded in shared values, spiritual conviction, cultural empowerment, and an unwavering commitment to truth, justice, and progress.

The coalition will focus on five core initiatives:

Shaping a unified national narrative that challenges harmful stereotypes and amplifies stories of Black resilience, excellence, and innovation

Mobilizing faith-based and media networks to address community disparities through solutions-focused advocacy and out-

reach

Holding corporate America accountable by demanding responsible reinvestment in Black communities through sustainable partnerships, economic equity, and community-led development

Empowering the next generation by reclaiming our narratives and creating new pathways for education, leadership, and entrepreneurship

Holding elected officials accountable by spotlighting those whose policies do not align with the interests of the Black community. To earn our votes, they must heed our voices.

“This is more than a

symbolic gesture; it is a strategic and spiritual alignment.” When the Black Church and Black Media speak as one, we can ignite a movement. When we organize as one, we can shift the narrative. When we act as one, we cannot be ignored or denied,” the

coalition stated.

The coalition invites all stakeholders, faith leaders, media professionals, community organizers, educators, business leaders, and concerned citizens to join this movement for unity, justice, and progress.

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Delivering Universal After-School Care for Working Families

Working-class families deserve nothing less than a hard-working administration that puts their needs first. And when it comes to child care and after-school programming, this administration has listened to the parents of this city and taken meaningful action to support children and make life more affordable for them.

For too long, too many families have been denied access to affordable child care, including options for young children and after-school programming. Families have struggled due to high costs, forcing them to make hard choices between working to put bread on the table and taking care of their kids, and some have even had to leave the city they love.

Parents deserve better, and our administration is delivering for them.

We know that learning doesn't end when the school bell rings at the end of the day. That is why, earlier this year, we announced the goal of achieving universal after-school by creating 20,000 additional K-5 after-school seats for New York City Public School students by the start of the 2027 school year.

Last week, we took another step in delivering on that promise with our first batch of 5,000 new after-school seats for this upcoming school year. We are investing an additional \$21 million this school year alone to bring 5,000 new K-5 after-school seats online at 40 schools that never had after-school programming. Starting this fall, 5,000 children in neighborhoods with the most need will have a safe and nurturing place to go when the school day is over. This means 5,000 students and their parents or guardians who will no longer have to choose between work and taking care of their kids — or worse yet, using an iPad as a babysitter.

Instead, children from working-class families will now have a spot in after-school programs

where they can learn and thrive. These 5,000 new after-school seats mark the first phase of our promise to commit an additional \$331 million for 20,000 new after-school seats over the next three school years and will bring the annual budget for universal after-school to \$755 million annually, baselined by Fiscal Year 2028. Baselined means the money will be in the budget forever, as we increase the number of students in after-school programming to 184,000 across our city. That is 184,000 students who will be able to participate in sports, robotics, the arts, field trips, and more — discovering their passions and building relationships with their classmates, while their parents know they are in a safe, learning environment.

Our after-school expansion will also see us raise the provider rates for the non-profit workforce that takes care of our children every day and who have gone over 10 years without an increase in pay. This means life will become more affordable for not only families, but those taking care of our kids, too.

This work builds on our historic investments in young people, including historic funding for

Summer Youth Employment and Summer Rising, and increased and baselined funding for 3-K and special education pre-K. Our administration has also driven down the cost of subsidized child care by over 90 percent since we first came into office. Thanks to our efforts, a family earning \$55,000 a year went from spending \$55 a week on childcare in 2022 to just \$4.80 a week today.

Additionally, we have introduced a historic child care pilot for children 2 years old and younger that puts New York City on the path to universal childcare for low-income families if the pilot is successful.

New York City must be a place where working-class families can afford to live. I know the struggle is real. My mother juggled three jobs just to put food on the table for her six children. Universal after-school and universal child care for low-income families is essential to making sure that every child and every family has the chance to thrive in the greatest city in the world. It takes a city to raise a child, and with universal after-school programming we are ensuring New York City is the best place to raise a family.

Although they see their beloved Harlem community transitioning before their eyes, many community residents are not prepared to buy. The truth of the matter is you cannot allow time to pass by. Home buying will require you having a good personal purchasing plan and confidence to succeed.

Here are a few helpful tips to assist you in completing the process: (1) Attend the home buyer education workshop with HCCI. This program will equip you with knowledge and provide step by step instructions. You will gain the confidence needed to successfully complete the home buying process. You will learn how to assemble your home buying team from industry professionals. The knowledge acquired of the home buying process will enable you to make better decisions. You will learn how to recognize and avoid falling victim to costly predatory lending practices.

(2) Create a monthly household budget and aggressively save as much money as possible. Avoid all wasteful spending. The home buying process

is extremely expensive. You will need lots of money to cover the minimum down payment, closing costs and other fees associated with purchasing a home. Most lenders will require at least 3-4 months mortgage payment in same account after you close on the property. You cannot exhaust all your financial resources just to get to the closing. Managing your money wisely is an essential key to completing the process and becoming a successful homeowner.

(3) Use your credit responsibly. Lenders will want to see 24 months' clean credit history with at least 3-4 active credit accounts. Pay your debts on time. Pay more each month than the minimum amount. Avoid any late fees, penalties, and additional interest payments. By staying on top of your credit debt, you will be increasing your monthly savings. The biggest reasons mortgage applications are denied, is due to poor credit history and high credit debt.

IMAX Brings Back Prince's Genius in "Sign O' The Times"

Prince is back—this time in a format as epic as the artist himself.

For one night only, fans can relive Sign O' The Times in stunning IMAX. On August 28, AMC theaters across the country will host opening night screenings of the iconic 1987 concert film, and attendees will receive a collectible, concert-style ticket. The film's official IMAX release begins globally on August 29, but early access showings are reserved for those ready to celebrate the Purple One in his full glory. Directed by Prince and originally released in 1987, Sign O' The Times captures the artist at the

height of his creative power—blending jaw-dropping live performances with cinematic storytelling. Thanks to IMAX's proprietary remastering process, the film has been transformed with precision surround sound, crystal-clear visuals, and immersive theater geometry that puts fans in the middle of the magic.

The re-release features some of Prince's most unforgettable tracks: the sultry "If I Was Your Girlfriend," the fiery duet "U Got The Look" with Sheena Easton, and the anthemic title track "Sign O' The Times," which speaks to the social and political chaos of its era—lyrics that still resonate today. Prince's stagecraft, musicianship, and style shine through in every frame. With longtime

collaborator Sheila E. and a full band of elite talent, the concert film isn't just a time capsule—it's a masterclass in performance and artistry.

Born in Minneapolis on June 7, 1958, Prince Rogers Nelson was a musical prodigy whose work shattered boundaries. After teaching himself to play piano, drums, bass, and guitar as a child, Prince recorded his debut album For You at the age of 20—producing, composing, and performing nearly every part himself. What followed was a run of genre-bending albums from 1980 to 1988 that made Prince a global force. 1999, Purple Rain, Parade, and Sign O' The Times pushed the limits of pop, funk, soul, rock, and everything in between. His 1984 film Purple Rain became a cultural

phenomenon, and in 1987, Prince opened his own creative headquarters: Paisley Park Studios. Prince's legacy is about more than hits and headlines. He fought publicly for artists' rights, famously protesting Warner Bros. by changing his name to an unpronounceable symbol. He demanded ownership of his masters—and ultimately won. He also used his platform to address racism, injustice, and freedom in songs like "Dreamer," "Baltimore," and "Colonized Mind."

His 2007 Super Bowl halftime performance—delivered in a downpour—remains the most acclaimed in NFL history. Until his death on April 21, 2016, Prince continued mentoring young musicians, releasing new music, and deliver-



ing unforgettable performances. Prince won seven Grammy Awards, an Oscar for Purple Rain, and was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 2004. In recent years, he received a posthumous doctorate from the University of Minnesota and was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame. Now, with the re-

lease of Sign O' The Times in IMAX, a new generation can witness the brilliance, the boldness, and the beauty of Prince in full scope.

For fans who lived it the first time, and for those who never got the chance—this is not just a movie. It's a reminder of the awe-inspiring greatness of Prince.



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Royalty Comes to Harlem

The first annual Harlem Cultural Tourism Summit will take place during HARLEM WEEK on Thursday August 14th at the Harlem Renaissance Marriott Hotel. The focus of the Cultural Tourism summit will be in three segments: The introduction of the City Within A City marketing campaign, The Harlem the birthplace of the Big Apple marketing campaign and the Cultural Tourism partnership announcement and marketing campaign between the Harlem Tourism Board and Northern

Ghana.

His Royal Majesty Buipe Wura Jinapor II will lead a delegation that will travel to Harlem for the conference. Many will be staying at the Harlem Renaissance. Jinapor II is Paramount chief of the Buipe Traditional Area and the President of the Buipe Traditional Council of Chiefs.

Chief Jinapor will officially announce the cultural tourism partnership between the Harlem Tourism Board and Northern Ghana. HTB will present Chief Jinapor with a Key to Har-

lem. A key to Harlem will also be presented to Dr. Tengol K. Kplemani, the Co-Founder of the Cultural Oneness Festival which takes place in December.

Dr. Kplemani and I met a few years ago in the WHCR 90.3 FM radio station. He was promoting his plans to develop a cultural oneness festival to bring Africans and the African diaspora together. The WHCR African connection show was before my Urbanology show.

I was introduced to Tengol when he completed his interview.

When he learned that I was a co-founder of HARLEM WEEK he asked me to be an advisor to the December Ghana festival now in its fourth year. Dr. Kplemani has been the key to my involvement in the development of the Cultural tourism industry between Harlem and Northern Ghana.

The “Harlem the Birthplace of the Big Apple” segment will introduce a marketing campaign to allow Harlem to reclaim the Big Apple nickname which was first published in Cab Calloway’s Hep-

ster Dictionary in 1939, a glossary of Jive talk during the Harlem Renaissance. On the first page A was Apple, the big town, the Main stem, Harlem. Harlem’s nickname as the Big Apple became known globally. In 1971 Gwen Barrett a young public affairs director for WNYW was given the task of developing a tourism PSA. Gwen lived in Harlem and her uncle was a well-known producer for many of the jazz greats like Dizzie Gillespie and Duke Ellington.

The term Big Apple was familiar to Gwen, Black jazz artist while abroad would say meet you back at the Apple. There was also a famous Harlem night spot, the Big Apple Grill that was located on 135th street and Lenox Avenue.

Gwen Barrett created the successful Big Apple marketing PSA for New York City. Duke Elling-

ton allowed Gwen to use his Big Apple music in her marketing PSA that gave New York the Big Apple nickname and marketing brand. but she never received credit for it.

Ms. Barrett will receive a special award of acknowledgement at the August 14 Cultural Tourism Summit. Arrangements have been made to have Jermaine “Kissk” Foots who will play Cab Calloway in the upcoming biopic “Chasing Cab,” due for release in December, to be one of the presenters to Ms. Barrett.

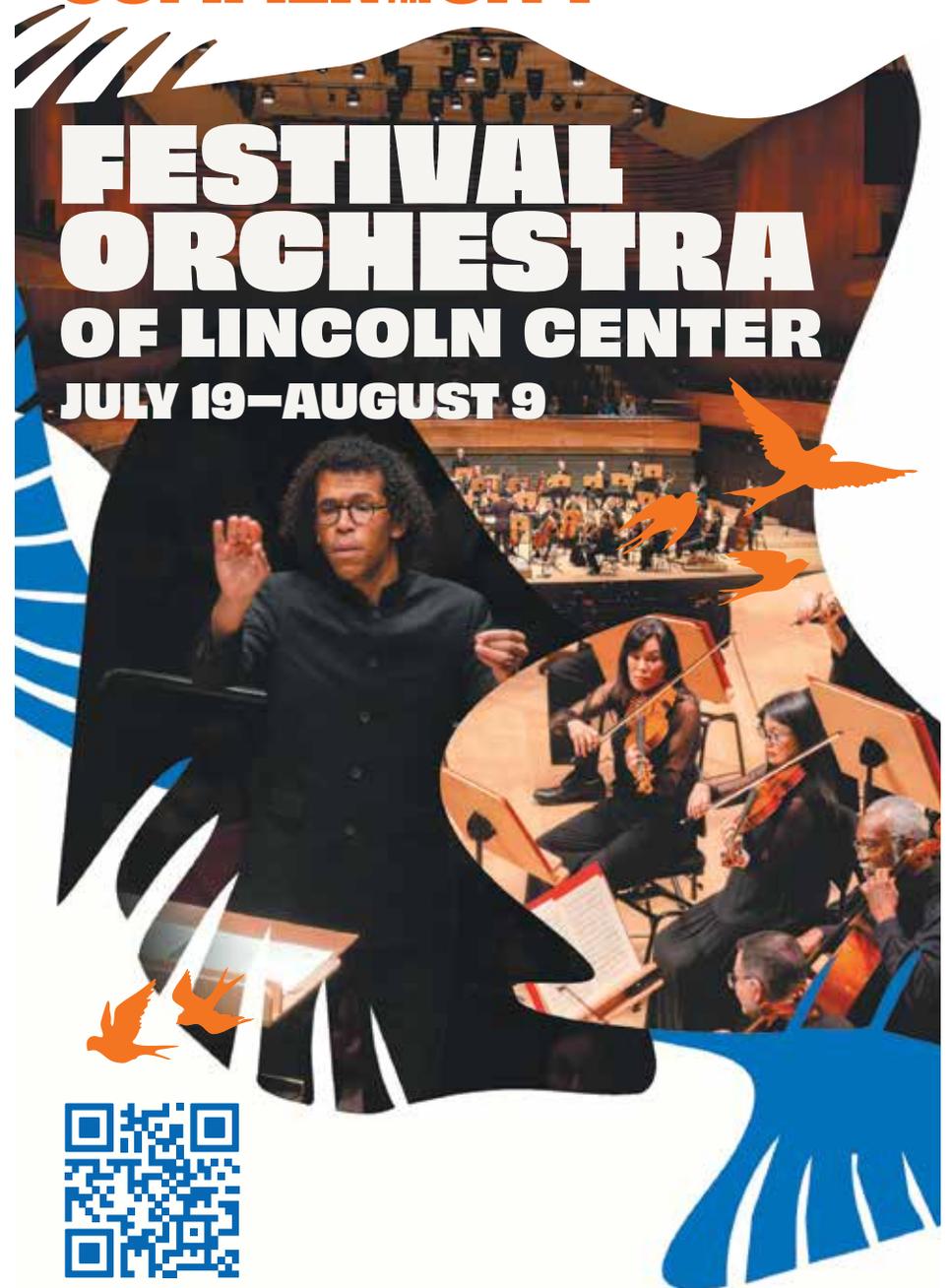

The 51st annual HARLEM WEEK returns August 1-17 for more than two weeks of live and virtual experiences to celebrate the rich arts and culture, people, entertainment and history of Harlem. Centered around the theme, "Celebrate Our Magic," this year's curation of festivities emphasize HARLEM WEEK's mission of providing a spiritual boost and positivity for Harlem, New York City and the "Harlems of the World."

Yarrow - Part 2 - The Essential Oil

The essential oil (EO) is as potent and versatile as when in its original plant/herb form. The essential oil of Yarrow is used to treat allergies, alleviate stress, and is known for its wonderful sweet aroma and brilliant deep blue color.

Yarrow EO can be used to stem blood oozing from a wound, as it can be poured neat into the wound to stop the blood flow. 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"Briefly Perfectly Human: Making an Authentic Life by Getting Real about the End"

There is no need to pack a big suitcase.

No more worrying about tickets or TSA, the nearest gas station, tiny bottles of shampoo, no journal, no favorite t-shirt. You'll say one last goodbye on this final journey and you'll be gone, but in **"Briefly Perfectly Human"** by Alua Arthur, as you did in living, you may need support in dying.

Born in Ghana, raised by parents who demanded excellence, Alua Arthur chose to go to law school after she graduated from high school. But it wasn't really a choice, in a way: law school was a default for her, and it didn't make her hap-

py. After she started working for Legal Aid on behalf of poor clients, a career in law actually made her sad.

It was so difficult for Arthur to avoid getting too involved with her clients, and she struggled. She eventually came to understand that she wanted more than anything, to "be of service" to people somehow. When her brother-in-law was diagnosed with cancer, she helped take care of him and things began to fall into place. She says he was "the first person I doula'd before knowing... what I was supposed to be doing."

Following Peter's death and her "aha!" moment, Arthur received formal death

doula training, where she learned "not to conflate others' experience with [her] own," how to gently discover a dying person's wishes, and how to *listen*. She does in-person visits or phone calls; she can't dispense medicine or medical advice. She can only talk, and that's often all an ill or dying person needs. It's a solution, Arthur says, that helps "meet a client where they are" but being a death doula isn't just for those who are dying.

"Sometimes," she says, "all we need is a little time, if we've got it.... And if you're the person who can't accept that another will die, we will hold you when you finally do."

So, here's a surprise for you: "Briefly Perfectly Human" may not be the book you want today. It touches upon a painful subject. There's no blatant advice here, no quizzes or checklists. You'll find comfort if you look hard enough, but it's not overt.

Instead – and maybe you *do* need it today – this book is mostly about being wonderfully, sparkingly *alive*. Joyful, even. Author Alua Arthur says, "I'm only here for a small amount of time," and that, in fact, should tell you everything you'd want to know about this book.

And yet, it has dark moments.

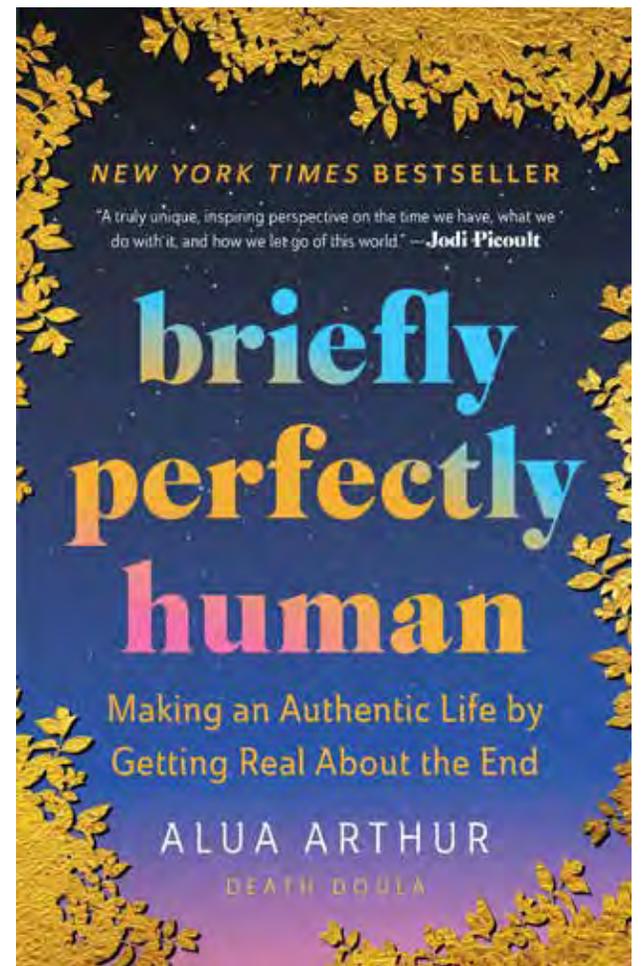
Arthur writes about specific clients and how she helped them and their families. There's a good bit biography here, where she shares her own struggles with depression and mental health. Beware: she's an

advocate of psychotropic substances and she's sometimes profane. She's also unabashedly honest, and that's refreshing.

Readers looking for advice or succor must read between the lines to find it here, but you won't mind. "Briefly Perfectly Human" reminds you to live each day as if it's your last, and that packs a punch.

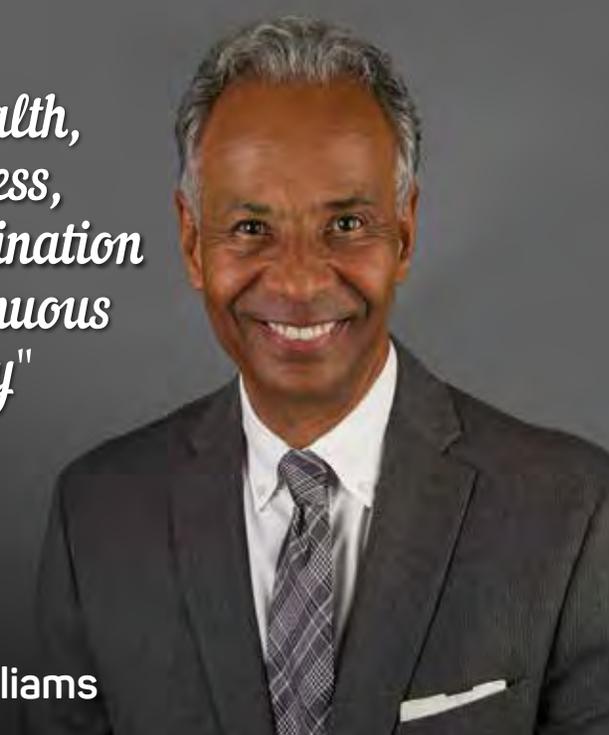

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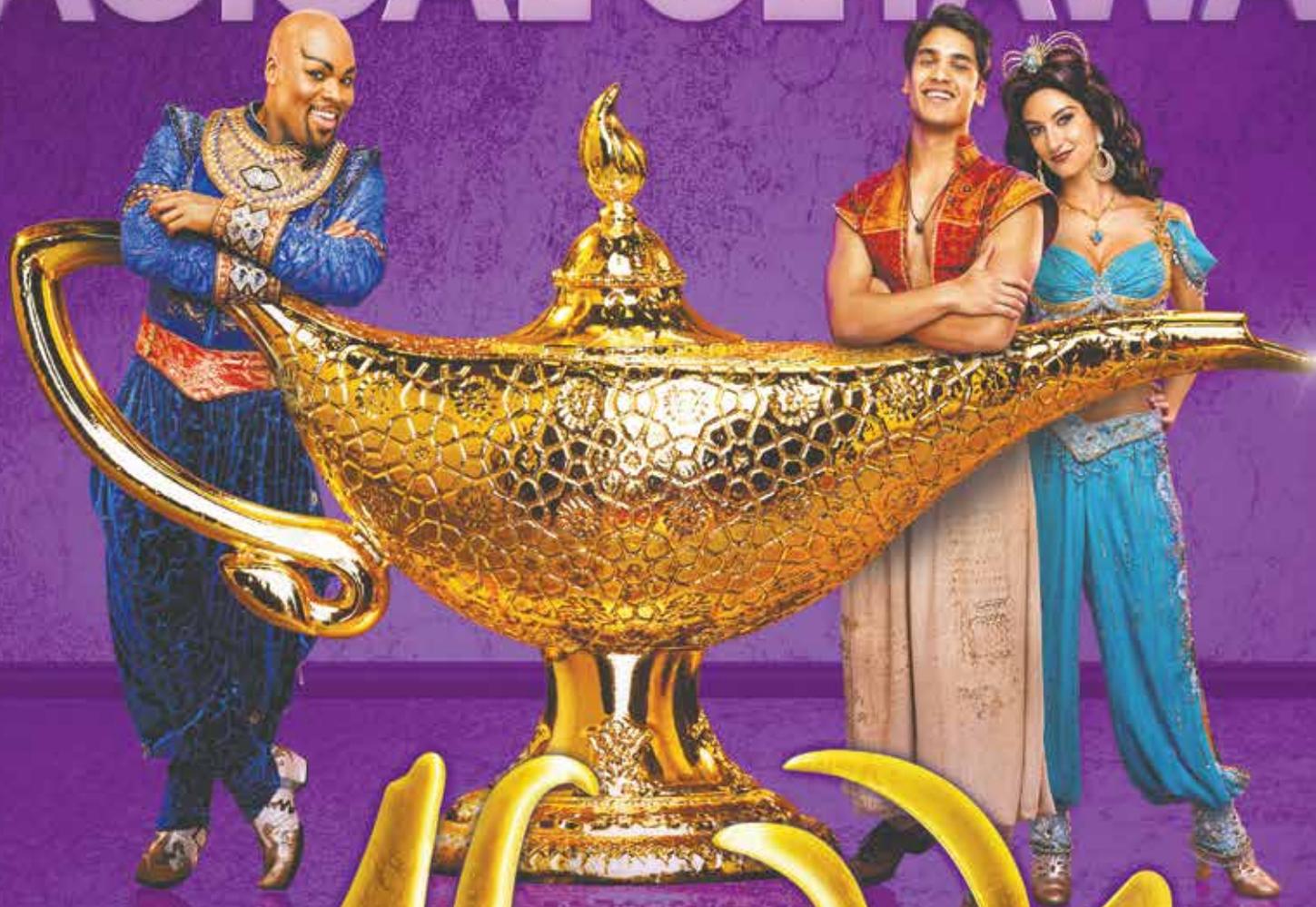


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
