
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# A New Black Migration Rises Under Trump's America

As the Trump administration renews its assault on social safety nets—from mental health care to housing and education—young Black Americans are migrating to cities that promise not only economic opportunity but community and freedom. The movement, experts say, reflects a modern Great Migration shaped by politics, culture, and survival. According to Apartment List's 2025 Best Cities for Black Professionals report, Washington, D.C., Atlanta, San Antonio, Houston, and Dallas lead the nation in economic and professional prospects for Black Americans. The study, developed with the Black employee resource group Black@A-List, used data on employment, income, homeownership, and representation across key professions to determine where Black professionals thrive despite national headwinds.

## Washington, D.C.:

### Power and Prosperity

Apartment List found that Washington, D.C., ranks first nationwide for economic opportunity among Black professionals, with a 92 percent employment rate and a median Black income of \$52,988, the highest in the country. Roughly 28 percent of D.C.'s population is Black, and 51 percent of Black households own their homes, placing the District third nationally for Black homeownership. The report also noted that more than one-quarter of businesses in D.C. are Black-owned. With How-

ard University and the University of the District of Columbia producing a steady stream of graduates, the capital remains a key center for Black leadership and innovation, even as federal policies threaten to dismantle the very programs that sustain progress.

## Atlanta: The Black

### Mecca Holds Its Crown

Atlanta earned the No. 2 ranking for best cities for Black professionals, leading the nation in "community and representation," according to Apartment List. The city's Black population makes up 36 percent of all residents, with a 93 percent employment rate and a 50 percent homeownership rate. Atlanta's strength, the report said, lies in its deep infrastructure of Historically Black Colleges and Universities that include Spelman, Morehouse, Clark Atlanta, and Morehouse School of Medicine, all of which have cultivated generations of Black scholars and leaders. About 37 percent of local businesses are Black-owned, a number that continues to climb despite rising housing costs and gentrification pressures.

## Houston and Dallas Texas's Twin Engines of Growth

In Texas, both Houston and Dallas ranked among the top five destinations for Black professionals. Houston's business environment ranked third in the nation, with 21 percent of local businesses Black-owned and a strong representation of Black professionals across in-



dustries; 21 percent of the city's teachers and doctors are Black. Apartment List noted that the median Black income in Houston is several thousand dollars above the national average. Dallas, with an 18 percent Black population and a 93 percent employment rate among Black residents, placed fifth nationally. Its Black median income of \$43,632 and increasing share of Black-owned businesses—now 19 percent—shows the city's growing reputation as a professional hub for young talent.

## The Carolina Renaissance

Charlotte and Raleigh, North Carolina, also earned spots among the top ten. Charlotte ranked tenth overall for Black professionals, driven by job growth in banking, energy, and technology. Raleigh, part of the Research Triangle, continues to

draw younger generations thanks to affordable housing, rising tech jobs, and the presence of HBCUs like Shaw University and St. Augustine's. A Home & Texture analysis of the top cities for Black renters in 2025 similarly highlighted the Southeast as a magnet for young professionals, citing Atlanta, Raleigh, and Huntsville, Alabama, for their affordability, cultural richness, and expanding Black business scenes.

## Chicago: Culture, Legacy, and Resistance

While Chicago faces economic challenges, it remains a beacon for Black culture and political engagement. The city's deep legacy, from Bronzeville's jazz clubs to the organizing power that gave rise to Barack Obama, continues to inspire young professionals determined to preserve and rebuild historically Black neighbor-

hoods rather than abandon them to gentrification.

## A New Great Migration

The pattern of movement is part of what House Beautiful described as a generational shift in its report *The Cities Young People Are Flocking to in 2026*. The publication noted that Gen Z and younger millennials increasingly choose cities that align with their values, prioritizing inclusion, sustainability, and community over corporate prestige. The trend mirrors the Great Migration of the 20th century, when millions of Black families fled the South for industrial jobs and personal safety. But this time, the exodus is less about geography and more about autonomy.

"Young Black professionals aren't running from the South. They're reclaiming it," said one researcher familiar with Apartment List's find-

ings. "They're moving where they can live, build wealth, and be free from the systems that have historically worked against them." As the Trump administration doubles down on policies rolling back diversity efforts, health access, and economic equity, young Black Americans are charting a new map of resilience. Cities like Atlanta, Houston, D.C., and Raleigh have become what one new resident called "freedom zones," or places where opportunity, community, and Black excellence are not just preserved but expanded. In a country veering toward authoritarian rule, this migration is both a strategy and a statement. It's the next chapter in the long journey toward self-determination, one city at a time.

Moving Closer to Affordable Child Care for NYC Families

Our city's child care costs rank among the highest in the nation, so every New Yorker knows a family member, a friend, or a colleague who has struggled to afford child care. From the earliest days of our administration, we have made affordable child care a priority and have said again and again that working-class New York City families should not have to choose between child care and putting food on the table.

Now, we are making our city more family friendly by launching New York City's first-ever Municipal Child Care Pilot Program. The program will provide affordable child care for employees of the Department

of Citywide Administrative Services — right where they work. We are achieving this by turning underutilized city-owned space into on-site, free child care centers for our workers. So even as they are doing their own jobs, city employees will know that their children are nearby, well looked after, and safe. The program will begin in September 2026, and — along with another \$10-million investment we made in a groundbreaking pilot program to provide free child care for children from low-income families aged two and under — more quickly puts our city on the path to universal child care.

City employees are the engine that keeps our city moving: cleaning our streets, teaching our children, and keeping us safe. With this program, we are giving back to some of these New Yorkers who do so much for us. This \$10-million investment also means city employees can have work-family balance, making a crucial difference — especially for working mothers.

We know that when mothers leave the workforce to care for a child, they forgo \$145,000 in earnings throughout their lifetime on average. If parents are forced to leave the workforce, families struggle, and our economy is weakened. I saw the struggle first-hand: my mother couldn't afford child care even though she worked three jobs just to put food on the table for her six kids and keep a roof over our heads. So, my sister had to help raise me and my siblings because the city was not there to help us when we needed it.

I am proud to say that our Municipal Child Care Pilot Program builds on the work we have already done to help put more money back into the pockets of municipal employees and make child care more affordable for all New Yorkers.

This work includes wiping out \$360 million in student loan debt for 100,000 of our hard-working public servants, and investing \$70 million in our "Best Budget Ever" towards supporting

pre-K special education students who require occupational therapy, speech therapy, and other related services.

We have also worked to make child care funding permanent in our city budget by adding \$170 million more into early childhood education. This allows critical programs like pre-K special education and the expansion of our citywide 3-K program to be supported into the future.

Additionally, we have driven down the cost of subsidized child care by over 90 percent since we came into office. Thanks to our efforts, a family earning \$55,000 a year went from spending \$55 a week on child care in 2022 to just \$4.80 a week today.

In New York, we know it takes a city to raise a child, and with these investments we are not only making our city more affordable but making it the best place to find opportunity, raise a family, and live the American Dream.





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# Home Buying in Harlem Be Prepared to Buy Now

I received an alarming call from a perspective home buyer this week. She was working with a program that provided her with a loan officer, a real estate broker, a real estate attorney and a home inspector. All these professionals were employed by one company. This is called a 'One Stop Home Buying Center.' I thought these organizations no longer existed, but I was wrong. They still exist and will try to steal your money!

It is never a good idea for your home buying team to come from one source. You must select the members of your team. You must remain in control of your home purchase. You must do research, interview, and select the members of your team. In this instance, her team used her lack of knowledge to work against her. She signed a contract without proper legal counsel and lost most

of her down payment. She called me seeking assistance to recoup her money. I told her she could report them, but since she had signed the contract there was little that could be done.

This is the importance of attending the home buyer education workshop seminar series offered at HCCI. Even if you are not eligible for the grant, the program could help you from making a costly mistake and losing your money. You should attend an approved housing counseling workshop at the beginning of the process.

The home buying workshop will give you insights on how to navigate through the dangerous waters of negotiating a purchase price, determining the right type of property for your specific needs and selecting a team of professionals. You will learn industry terminology, mortgage products and available grant programs. You will acquire the confidence needed to successfully become a homeowner.

Here are some things you need to know: (1) Do not make an offer on a home until you have a pre-approval letter from an authorized lender. Know how much

you can afford to spend on a monthly mortgage payment. Understand the various types of mortgage products and determine which one is suitable for you. If you make an offer before getting a pre-approval your deposit will be in jeopardy.

(2) Sign nothing until your attorney has reviewed the sales contract. Sit down with your attorney and go over the contract with him/her until you completely understand all its legal ramifications. Once you and the seller have signed the contract, it is a legally binding document. It can be very difficult to get out of the agreement.

(3) Get referrals from your housing counselor or people you trust who have just recently completed the home buying process. Do not under any circumstances do what is called "a one stop shop" where the entire team is pre-selected.

## NY Atty Gen Letitia James is Arraigned in Virginia as Black Women Stand in Support of Her

**T**ish James, the New York Attorney General, will be arraigned in Norfolk, Virginia, today on one count of bank fraud. Advocacy groups are at the courthouse in support of James to deliver a strong message against intimidating strong Black Women. NAACP New York State Conference President, L. Joy Williams, told Black Press USA exclusively, “These attacks on Attorney General Tish James are not just about her, they’re about trying to intimidate strong Black women who lead with courage and integrity. “James will challenge the case with a request to dismiss, citing allegations that the Trump-appointed interim U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia, Lindsey Halligan sent messages about the indictment on a Signal chat to a Lawfare reporter, whom she later claimed was off the record. The reporter posted the information on social media. The Trump loyalist Halligan brought the charges against James after the president mistakenly leaked a text message on social media, in which Trump had requested that the U.S. Attorney General, Pam Bondi, charge James and others he believed had wronged him politically. Trump is retaliating against James for her lengthy investigation into the Trump organization, which he deemed “a witch hunt.” James led a three-year investigation that resulted in a civil fraud lawsuit against The Trump Organization, Donald Trump, and his chil-



dren, alleging that they inflated the values of financial statements to defraud lenders and others. The result was a fraud ruling against the Trumps. However, Trump won an appeal that overturned any monetary penalty.

Halligan, whose background is in insurance, initiated the process earlier this year for the president to launch an attack on what the administration perceived as WOKE and DEI exhibits in the Smithsonian Museums. Halligan was also directed to dismantle the slavery exhibits at the National Museum of African-American History and Culture. Black Women’s groups, rights organizations, and advocates are in Norfolk, Virginia, today in support of AG James, who is in the crosshairs of Trump’s retribution. Advocacy organizations are making it clear that they will stand with Tish James by hosting a rally in Norfolk and another on Sunday when she returns home to New York. “We’re gathering Sunday to say loud and clear: Hands off Tish, hands off Black women, hands off our democracy,” said Williams.

Glynda Carr, CEO and President, Higher Heights for America, elaborated, “Black women in leadership are too often targeted when we stand firm in our purpose, but we will not be silenced or intimidated.” Carr laments, “This week, we’ve seen two Black women leaders, AG James and Congresswoman LaMonica McIver, targeted by the weaponization of the Justice Department for simply doing their jobs.” “What’s happening to Attorney General Letitia James is not justice; it’s retaliation. AG James has spent her career standing up for everyday people, holding the powerful accountable, and defending democracy. Now, those same forces are trying to punish her for that very work,” added Carr. Since the indictment, there have been strategy calls among organizations to figure out the best ways to support James without endangering the activists. “We stand in support of AG James and Congresswoman McIver because this isn’t just their fight, it’s every Black woman’s fight to lead, to serve, and to seek justice without fear or retribution,” emoted Carr.



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# GHCC Convenes Top Health Experts to Tackle Disparities at 2025 National Urban Health Conference

The Greater Harlem Chamber of Commerce (GHCC) hosted its 2025 National Urban Health Conference on Wednesday, October 8, at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture. Presented by Mount Sinai Health System and Harlem Hospital, the event united healthcare experts, innovators, and community advocates to find solutions for bridging the digital divide, particularly in managing chronic diseases within urban communities.

Under the theme “Your Health is Your Wealth,” the conference addressed health disparities in disadvantaged communities. Host Padmore John, The Chamber’s Health Committee Chair, highlighted

the disproportionate burden of chronic illness, noting: “Black/African American adults are 20% more likely to have diagnosed hypertension and 1.4 times more likely to be diagnosed with diabetes than non-Hispanic white adults. These stark disparities demand innovative, technology-enabled solutions grounded in community wisdom.”

Keynote speaker Dr. Icilma Fergus, Director of the Mount Sinai Center for Cardiovascular Disparities, framed technology as a critical solution to these inequities. “Technology is not just a tool; it can be a bridge,” Dr. Fergus stated. “With innovations like AI and remote monitoring, we are not just collecting data; we are building pathways to

equitable care, reaching patients where they are.” She demonstrated this progress by introducing “Sophie,” Mount Sinai’s AI-generated patient assistant, a practical example of data-driven intervention.

Panel discussions further explored how to harness technology effectively. The Chronic Disease Management panel, moderated by Dr. Maurice Hinson, delved into making digital tools accessible and manageable. Dr. Alexis Chidi emphasized using data analytics for “proactive, preventative strategies,” while Dr. Daniel King highlighted the need for “culturally competent and user-friendly” telehealth to ensure no one is left behind.

Mamta Parakh, Chief Population Health and Data Officer for the NYC Department of Health & Hygiene, keynoted the second panel, calling data “our most powerful asset” for allocating resources and building a healthier city. Dr. Eric Ward Carson further illustrated this, explaining how remote monitoring significantly improves post-operative patient care and recovery, and Dr. Samuel L. Seward, Jr. stressed that “preventative education and early intervention are essential for lasting community health.”

The conference concluded with remarks from Harlem Hospital CEO Georges H. LeConte and GHCC Executive Director Winston Majette, who both reaffirmed their commitment



to collaborative action. The event stands as a key part of the GHCC’s broader mission to address critical community needs and showcase Harlem’s global presence.

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# Living Well With Pulmonary Arterial Hypertension (Statepoint)

November is Pulmonary Hypertension Awareness Month, and the American Lung Association, with support from Merck, is raising awareness about one form of the condition: pulmonary arterial hypertension (PAH).

Once accurately diagnosed, Jackson’s family embarked on a journey of managing PAH in their young child, “We had to

figure out how to manage a toddler with a subcutaneous pump. It was terrifying, but we knew it was what he needed,” says Jayna.

No matter the age of the patient, these key actions can help your family navigate a diagnosis of pulmonary hypertension:

Find a trusted PH specialist. A specialist will tailor your treatment specific to your needs. Being able to talk with your specialist is vital in developing your personalized care plan. As Jackson shares, “My doctor is amazing,” assisting him with a comprehensive healthcare plan and helping him navigate PAH as he transitions from childhood to adolescence.

Learn all you can about PH and PAH. Take the PH Basics course offered by the American Lung Association. This free, short online module is designed to help patients and caregivers understand symptoms, monitoring, treatment options and more.

Activate your support network. Join support groups and peer communities to build knowledge and resilience and receive emotional support. Jayna found an online pulmonary hypertension community of other parents, which made it “easier to cope, learn from others and feel less isolated,” and eventually became one of the community’s administrators.

# The United States Needs More Afterschool Programs, New Study Finds

**N**inety-five percent of parents with a child enrolled in an afterschool program are satisfied with that program, and there is overwhelming support for more government funding for afterschool, according to a new study. But unmet demand for these programs is high in all 50 states, and majorities of middle- and low-income families who want afterschool programs are being shut out.

The parents of 29.6 million children, more than half the school-age students in the United States, want afterschool programs for their chil-

dren – but just 7 million children are currently enrolled. Another 22.6 million children would attend afterschool programs if they were available. That means three in four of the children (77%) whose parents want to enroll them in an afterschool program are being left behind. Cost, availability, and accessibility are the barriers families cannot overcome.

Those are among the findings of “America After 3PM 2025,” a report released in October by the Afterschool Alliance. The survey of 30,515 U.S. parents of school-age children finds a wide, and widening, opportunity gap, with children in

low- and middle-income families more likely to be without the afterschool programs their parents want for them than children in high-income families. Families in the highest income bracket now spend approximately nine times as much on out-of-school time activities as families in the lowest income bracket, up sharply from five years ago.

“Afterschool programs give students a safe place to go after the school day ends, boost their academic achievement, help address the youth mental health and chronic absenteeism crises, provide alternatives to screen time, give working parents peace of

mind that their children are safe and supervised, and more,” said Afterschool Alliance executive director Jodi Grant. “But there aren’t nearly enough afterschool programs to meet the need.”

More than 8 in 10 parents agree that afterschool programs provide opportunities for children to learn life skills like interacting with peers and responsible decision making, and help them develop teamwork, critical thinking, and leadership skills. Eighty-four percent say afterschool programs allow working parents to keep their jobs or work more hours, and 92% of parents with a child in a program say

“Our country will be stronger and more successful when all children can take advantage of what afterschool programs offer – but, sadly,

this study shows we’re nowhere near reaching that goal,” Grant added. “We need greater support from federal, state and local governments, businesses, and philanthropy. Every child deserves access to a quality afterschool program.”

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

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# "Champion: A Graphic Novel"

Your future is all laid out. Work a few summers, graduate, go to college, gather awards and go on to a great career, more awards, big money, lots of fame. That's Plan A and there is no Plan B. But in the new graphic novel, "Champion" by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Raymond Obstfeld, illustrated by Ed Laroche, life may have other ideas for you.

Monk Travers just wasn't thinking.

He never figured that breaking into a rival high school's hallway and vandalizing their mascot mural would have such awful effects. He didn't plan on getting caught and he certainly didn't figure that his coach would make him sit

out the next big basketball game.

He was the team's best player, so that would hurt – the team, for the points he wouldn't make; and Monk, because basketball was his thing. It was the only thing, as far as he was concerned, because Monk planned on becoming a professional basketball player after graduation.

And so he was benched, plus Coach gave him an assignment. Monk had to write and present an essay about Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Not on Jabbar's games, but on his life.

When Coach gave him the assignment, it seemed like everything and everyone was coming down on Monk. His parents and his boss at his part-time

job both scolded him for not paying attention to his other talents, his artistic work or his piano playing. His "girlfriend-ish," Lark, was mad at Monk for not being supportive and for missing her big ball game. The guys on his team were embarrassed that they had to help clean the mural Monk had defaced. And then there was this ghost, an invisible spirit of Kareem Abdul-Jabbar that kept popping into Monk's head, just when he didn't need it. Why was Monk's imagination so insistent on telling him things he didn't want to hear?

He had a week to do the assignment. How could he focus when so much was happening?


In a way, "Champion" is something rare: it's a book that will appeal to anyone, teen to adult, but it leans more toward an audience of older boys and young men, and that's good to see. Another happy thing: it's graphic novel format has quite a bit of biography in it, as authors Abdul-Jabbar and Obstfeld write at length about Jabbar's life and accomplishments. Readers will know that this isn't just another comic-book-type story.

All that aside, the biggest appeal in this book is that the authors talk the talk without preaching. They also uplift girls, parents, and local businesses inside this tale, without making any of the characters seem like caricatures and without ridiculing any group of people. It's a good, moral story that doesn't have the feel of a

lecture and it's hard not to get behind that. Artwork by Ed Laroche just underscores the fun of reading it.

If you or your basketball-crazy reader wants a good story with an inspirational biography embedded within, find "Champion." You won't be able to lay it down.
