
The Studio Museum is set to reopen later this month after years of renovation, promising a renewed cultural experience. (see page 20)

PONDER THIS! Straighten Up and Fly Right

Perhaps you have used a song title to get your message across in a personal situation. Remember: "What's Going On," by Marvin Gaye, and "I Will Survive," by Gloria Gaynor, among numerous others. My favorite delves into a question by Brian Knight inquiring, "Do I Ever Cross your Mind Anytime."

In 1943, Nat King Cole partnered with Irving Mills in the writing of "Straighten Up and Fly Right." The words of the song came to Cole from a sermon on truth and trust preached by his father, who was a pastor. It became an instant hit for the King Cole Trio.

Unfortunately, Cole was on the sidelines watching the monetary

progression of his work move to a million-dollar recording without reaping royalty fees because he had sold his rights to Irving Mills for a mere \$50.

To add salt to Nat's wound, his song was also recorded by The Andrew Sisters, who had become the most popular female group of the forties and took it to even greater heights singing it to troops during the war.

Straighten up and fly right were words often used by my father to influence my brother to do the right thing, which was a warning in the song given by a monkey to a buzzard in the storyline.

The gist of the lyrics was to expose the trickery of the buzzard, who was offering rides on his back

to smaller birds. Upon reaching a height above their flying capacity, the buzzard would unexpectedly shake the bird loose and digest it upon its descent.

If contemplation is given to why the buzzard would approach something smaller than himself with an offer of a fun time ride on his back, the revelation is how bullies get over on smaller and more vulnerable subjects.

Simply put, be careful of what is offered to you, without first considering why and how the offer came and most importantly from whom it is coming. I like to believe that straightening up means facing the facts realistically so that you can stand confident in your deci-

sion-making. Flying right is moving along appropriately with a focus on what you know to be the truth.

To do better, we must be better and that is an individual process that can benefit collectively. Contemplation and meditation are the tools for good decision making. You have the right to take your time. Do not be tempted by a free ride.

School Safety Saves Lives!

I've always said that public safety is the prerequisite to prosperity in our city and it has always been our administration's North Star. We strive to ensure that all New Yorkers feel safe in their homes, on the streets, and in other public spaces — this includes in our schools where our young people spend much of their time.

Our students must be able to feel safe in school so they can focus on their studies, parents must feel that they are leaving their children in a secure environment, and our teachers and staff must feel confident that we are keeping them safe at work so they can focus on teaching our young ones.

That is why our administration is proud to announce this country's first pilot program that directly integrates public schools with New York City's 911 services. Through this new initiative, we will be able to save lives by providing rapid response in active shooter situations.

We have tested this program, and now, we are rolling it out to a total of 51 schools across the five boroughs during the 2025-2026 school year, starting with the Spring Creek campus in Brooklyn.

Our Emergency Alert System (EAS) can be activated from multiple fixed buttons and wireless lanyards within a school, and it is capable of initiating a 911 response in under 10 seconds without going through a switchboard. This school-activated EAS will also bypass the New York City 911 call flow and be routed directly to real-time dispatch.

At the same time, schools will provide audio and visual cues that notify students and faculty that New York City 911 has been alerted and that their school is on a hard lock-down.

In an ideal world, we would not need to be planning for how to respond in the case of a school shooting, but sadly, we do not live in an ideal world — and in our current reality, we must be proactive and ready for all possibilities, however shocking they may be.

Since we came into office nearly four years ago, our administration has already taken more than 24,300 illegal guns off our streets, and thanks to our proactive public safety efforts, shooting incidents and shooting victims are at their lowest levels in the city's recorded history.

Shootings have also decreased by 55 percent and homicides have declined by 36.5 percent citywide compared to the same period before

we came into office, and in October 2025, major crimes dropped by 6.5 percent.

New York City is and remains the safest big city in America, and our new EAS will build on our work to make sure our schools have the most secure line of defense possible as we protect our students, teachers, and school staff.

Home Buying in Harlem Be Prepared to Buy Now

I received an alarming call from a perspective home buyer this week. She was working with a program that provided her with a loan officer, a real estate broker, a real estate attorney and a home inspector. All these professionals were employed by one company. This is called a 'One Stop Home Buying Center.' I thought these organizations no longer existed, but I was wrong. They still exist and will try to steal your money!

It is never a good idea for your home buying team to come from one source. You must select the members of your team. You must remain in control of your home purchase. You must do research, interview, and select the members of your team. In this instance, her team used her lack of knowledge to work against her. She signed a contract without proper legal counsel and lost most of her

down payment. She called me seeking assistance to recoup her money. I told her she could report them, but since she had signed the contract there was little that could be done.

This is the importance of attending the home buyer education workshop seminar series offered at HCCI. Even if you are not eligible for the grant, the program could help you from making a costly mistake and losing your money. You should attend an approved housing counseling workshop at the beginning of the process.

The home buying workshop will give you insights on how to navigate through the dangerous waters of negotiating a purchase price, determining the right type of property for your specific needs and selecting a team of professionals. You will learn industry terminology, mortgage products and available grant programs. You will acquire the confidence needed to successfully become a homeowner.

Here are some things you need to know: (1) Do not make an offer on a home until you have a pre-approval letter from an authorized lender. Know

how much you can afford to spend on a monthly mortgage payment. Understand the various types of mortgage products and determine which one is suitable for you. If you make an offer before getting a pre-approval your deposit will be in jeopardy.

(2) Sign nothing until your attorney has reviewed the sales contract. Sit down with your attorney and go over the contract with him/her until you completely understand all its legal ramifications. Once you and the seller have signed the contract, it is a legally binding document. It can be very difficult to get out of the agreement.

(3) Get referrals from your housing counselor or people you trust who have just recently completed the home buying process. Do not under any circumstances do what is called "a one stop shop" where the entire team is pre-selected.




“Hamilton” playing at the Richard Rodgers Theatre, is a beloved musical that focuses on the life of Alexander Hamilton. The

Annual Studio Museum in Harlem Gala Celebrates Fall 2025 Opening of its New Building

On Monday, October 27, leaders of the Studio Museum in Harlem welcomed more than seven hundred and fifty artists, cultural luminaries, civic leaders, philanthropists, and a host of prominent New Yorkers to the Museum's annual Gala, held at The Glasshouse (660 12th Avenue, New York). In anticipation of the Museum's public opening of its new home on 125th Street in Harlem on November 15, the annual event celebrated the Museum's past, present, and future, and honored long-time Trustees Gordon J. Davis, Sandra Grymes, Arthur J. Humphrey Jr., George L. Knox, and the late Nancy L. Lane, who have collectively given two hundred and nineteen years of service to the Museum's Board of Trustees.

Thelma Golden, Director and Chief Curator, said, "For almost sixty years, the Studio Museum in Harlem has been a champion of artists of African descent. Tonight, it stands on the threshold of its future, just days away from opening a new home; the Museum's first ever purpose-built space. We have reached this moment thanks to, and inspired by, all of you who are here, and so many who have come before us."

Golden greeted the guests and presented the annual Joyce Alexander Wein Artist Prize to Kenturah Davis.

Raymond J. McGuire, Chairman of the Board, said, "Tonight, let's remember: this isn't just about bricks and mortar, it's about legacy and light. The Studio Museum has never simply reflected the times; it has helped shape them. And as we open our doors in a few weeks, we will do so with the same conviction that guided our founders in 1968: with faith in art, and faith in community."

Davis earned her BA from Occidental College and MFA Yale University School of Art. Davis was commissioned by LA Metro to create large-scale, site-specific works permanently installed on the new Crenshaw/LAX rail line. Davis was an inaugural artist fellow at NXTHVN in New Haven, CT.

The Studio Museum in Harlem is internationally known for its catalytic role in promoting the work of artists of African descent. The Studio Museum is preparing to open its new home at its long-time location on West 125th Street. Designed by Adjaye Associates with executive architect Cooper Robertson, the building—the first created expressly for the institution's program—will enable the Studio Museum to better serve a growing and diverse audience, provide additional educational opportunities for people of all ages, expand its program of world-renowned exhibitions, effectively display its singular collection, and strengthen its trailblazing Artist-in-Residence program.

The Walls Remember: Murals and the Unyielding Story of Black America

You can try to bury people. You can rewrite their history books, close their schools, and burn their libraries. You can pass laws that punish truth-tellers and silence teachers who dare speak the name of freedom. But you cannot silence color. You cannot silence the wall. Across this country, in cities both proud and scarred, the story of Black America refuses to die. It is written not in the ink of permission, but in the paint of defiance. It rises on concrete, brick, and steel. The murals speak where the history books fall silent.

Philadelphia, the so-called birthplace of America, has become a vast open-

air scripture of the Black experience. On its walls, the dead rise again, the forgotten are called by name, and the children of this century inherit the truth their nation keeps trying to erase. Mural Arts Philadelphia has filled the city with living testimony. The Colored Conventions: A Buried History calls back the men and women who, long before Emancipation, gathered to demand that their humanity be recognized. The Legacy of Bishop Richard Allen reminds every passerby that resistance can begin with a single step away from the back of a segregated church.

Across Germantown Avenue, Harriet Tubman &

the Underground Railroad stands as both memory and prophecy. Nearby, Octavius Catto returns through Remembering a Forgotten Hero, his face no longer hidden in the shadows of history. And then there is Dr. J, the mural of Julius Erving not as an athlete but as a man—a man of dignity, intellect, and command. These walls do not whisper; they roar. In Baltimore, the paint itself breathes. The city holds a long lineage of African American creativity, from the classrooms of Morgan State University to the heart of the Black Arts District along Pennsylvania Avenue. The murals of Ernest Shaw tower above streets once broken by ne-

glect, affirming that art can be armor and prayer all at once.

Baltimore's artists work in the spirit of survival. They know that the paintbrush, in the hands of the oppressed, becomes a weapon sharper than any blade. Their colors speak to a people long told to be invisible, declaring instead, We are still here. Out west, Los Angeles wears its resistance across miles of concrete. Its murals were born in the heat of rebellion and the ache of inequality. The artists of SPARC, the Social and Public Art Resource Center, took what was once the language of graffiti and turned it into gospel.

Charles "Boko" Freeman's Return to the Light reflects a hunger for justice, while Noni Olabisi's To Protect and Serve lays bare the truth of state violence. City officials tried to silence her, but her work still stares down the same forces she painted against. Alice Patrick's Women Do Get Weary But They Don't Give Up honors the women who built the bones of America: Mary McLeod Bethune, Dorothy Height, Josephine Baker, and Oprah Winfrey. Women who carried nations on their backs and never complained of the weight. These murals are not decorations. They are sermons painted in public view, declaring that beauty without justice is a lie.

In Topeka, Kansas, across from the sacred ground of Brown v. Board of Education, a mural calls the people to remember the battle that opened the schoolhouse doors. In Birmingham, Alabama, the



colors stretch across old segregation lines, transforming the streets of suffering into streets of pride. In Jacksonville, Florida, the likenesses of A. Philip Randolph, Zora Neale Hurston, and James Weldon Johnson speak to the city's long lineage of brilliance. These are not mere portraits; they are warnings and promises painted on brick. At St. Louis Lambert International Airport, a mural spans 51 feet of history. Black Americans in Flight tells of men and women who defied both gravity and hatred. Created by Spencer Taylor and Solomon Thurman, it chronicles the Tuskegee Airmen, astronaut Mae Jemison, and Ronald McNair, who perished in the Challenger explosion but are not remembered. Every panel sings of ascent. It is a mural that tells every traveler what America owes to those who lifted her higher than she deserved to go.

Even in the seat of power, where politics tries to silence the soul, the walls still speak. At The Wharf, artist Shawn Perkins painted portraits of Benjamin Banneker, Marvin Gaye, and Reverend Anthony Bowen, each one a local monument to a greater story. Just

blocks away, the "Black Lives Matter" mural once stretched across the pavement like a hymn of protest, bright yellow and unyielding. Before Mayor Muriel Bowser was forced to capitulate to Donald Trump and remove the plaza, it pointed straight toward the White House as if to remind those inside: This nation was built by hands it tried to chain. Before any of these murals, there was Aaron Douglas. In 1934, his series Aspects of Negro Life told the story from the shores of Africa through the slave ships and into the modern city. His art carried the weight of memory and the hope of deliverance. Douglas painted the very thing this country still refuses to see: that Black life is America's most enduring masterpiece.

The murals that cover this nation are not ornaments. They are testaments. They are the faces of ancestors who will not fade. Each brushstroke defies the lie that our story can be rewritten. Each color insists that our memory cannot be outlawed. Black history is not a month. It is not a chapter. It is a mural that stretches across the American conscience, daring anyone to paint over it.

Green also understood that this was the height of Jim Crow laws and many rest stops, dinners, motels and stores were white only and some were unfriendly. There were even some areas that were dangerous for African Americans to pass through, especially during the night.

The Green book as it was often called was created by Victor Hugo Green to provide travelers of color with locations where they could find food, fuel and lodging in a safe environment. The Green book also identified a wide range of hospitable amenities and services available along their routes.

After his death on October 16th, 1960, Green's wife Alma S. Duke continued to

publish and edit the book until 1966. It was a wonderful travel guide for people of color through out the United States with a major focus for motorist traveling from the South to Harlem, Green's famous community.



"How I know White People are Crazy and Other Stories" by Dr. Jonathan Mathias Lassiter

It's enough to make you lose your mind.

You see your goal, but there's a barrier in front of it, a barrier that makes no sense. Other people don't have to jump through hoops or over walls to succeed, feel safe, or get help so why do you? In "How I Know White People are Crazy and Other Stories" by Dr. Jonathan Mathias Lassiter, you'll see that an old nemesis has a new name.

He says he is not angry.

Dr. Lassiter is just really, frustrated and for good reason: throughout most of his life, his father's life and his grandfather's, through his college years and his career, Dr. Lassiter says that "whiteness mindset" – defined

as a condition that causes people of any race (but most often white people) to assume that their lives are more important than others, which allows them to justify oppressing those who are different - has never been far away.

Sadly, Lassiter says, anyone can be on the receiving end of whiteness mindset, but it happens most often to the majority-minority including Black people, Asians, woman, and to gay people like him.

He says that his grandfather lived under racism and it showed: he loved his children, but didn't feel that he could demonstrate it. Lassiter's father parented similarly because that's all he knew. Living low-income also

affected Lassiter's mental health, as did the barriers he was forced to overcome in college due to racism and the oppression he felt because of his sexuality. Seeing what could be, if there were no such things as racism and oppression, didn't help.

Through his work as a licensed clinical psychologist and the patients he's treated, he knows his experiences are not unique. He also knows that whiteness mindset is not limited to higher education or the workplace and to combat it, we first have to admit that whiteness is not the concern. The mindset itself and what it does to mental health are bigger issues, and becoming educated is a great way to combat them.

Don't be surprised if you're a little confused at the outset of "How I Know White People are Crazy and Other Stories." It is confusing; Dr. Jonathan Mathias Lassiter writes quickly with a whirlwind of ideas that circle back to one another like ripples in a pond on a windy day. It might make you want to just back away.

Instead, stick around and trust that the meat of the book is coming through stories of real-life counseling and of Lassiter's own life, experiences, and family history. These tales eventually settle the chaos down, offering the clarity missing in the opening pages and allowing readers to see "whiteness mindset" in action and to understand the conflicts within it. You'll be

able to clearly see where Lassiter's frustration lies, and what can be done about it.


Just know that to get there will take some doing and patience with "How I Know White People Are Crazy and Other Stories." Try it, though. Persevere, and you might not mind.
